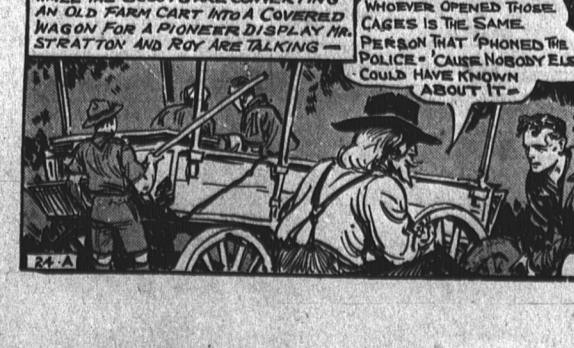

Blake Gives Canucks Win Over Amerks

MONTREAL, Feb. 9.—(CP)—Toe Blake turned in a brilliant four-goal performance tonight to pace the last-place Montreal Canadiens to a 5-2 National Hockey League victory over the third place New York Americans. It was the first victory for Canadiens in six starts this season against the Manhattanites.

Blake's four goals equalled the season's mark for a single game. Syl Apps of Toronto Maple Leafs was the first to turn the feat recently on Montreal ice against the Canadiens. The remaining Canadiens goal went to Toe Blake in the second period on a shot from a seemingly impossible angle from the side.

Austin Hopes To Promote Goodwill In His Return To Davis Cup Competition

BY SCOTLY RESION Associated Press Sports Writer LONDON, Feb. 9.—(AP)—H. W. (Bunny) Austin, British finalist in last year's Wimbledon Tennis Championships, is returning to Davis Cup competition this year.

The retirement of Don Budge of the United States from amateur play has not influenced Austin's decision, because he does not think he can help Britain win back the famous trophy.

He explains: "The crisis in England last September changed my reasoning on practically everything. I feel that in these days it is my duty to try to make as many friends as possible in other countries."

Oxford Group Leader Austin, who withdrew from Davis Cup competition year before last "to give younger players a chance," has for the past four months been leading an Oxford Group movement in Britain for "moral rearmament."

An introspective and idealistic young man, dramatist, poet, and Cambridge graduate, Austin apparently was deeply moved by the events that led his country to the edge of war.

Germany and Czechoslovakia each have a win, a tie and a loss in the semi-final pool and will have to play again to determine which advances to the final pool. The pucksters from the Third Reich were completely outclassed by the Canadian Allan Cup holders, who are defending the championship won by Sudbury Wolves last year and Kimberley Dynamiters the year before.

Bull Placed On "Inactive List"

TORONTO, Feb. 9.—(CP)—Conny Smythe, Manager of Toronto Maple Leafs, today announced that Buzz Boll had been placed on the "inactive list" with the hope the winger might be ready for National Hockey League play in two weeks.

The Plymouth, Sask. speedster suffered a severe knee injury early in the N. H. L. season, and recently was sent to Syracuse Stars, Toronto farm team, for conditioning.

Smythe said that if Boll was pronounced 100 per cent by doctors in two weeks time, he would join the Leafs who have but 13 scheduled games yet to play. If the knee is not in first class shape, Smythe said Buzz would see no more action this season.
