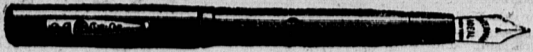

# WEARY OF THRONE, KING GEORGE MAY QUIT

VIENNA, Nov 24—King George of Greece, says the Wiener Allgemeine Zeitung, which is inspired by the Austrian foreign office, has resumed the idea of abdicating for himself and his dynasty. The King cannot overcome the fact that his sons have been forced to quit the army and the navy, a fact which he believes renders it impossible for the crown prince ever to ascend the throne, after having been excluded from the country's service. Efforts are being made on the part of several courts to dissuade the King from taking this step. His majesty last August determined to resign, and made all preparations only giving up the idea on receipt of

## BARON FISHER OF KILVERSTONE

LONDON, Nov 25—Admiral Sir Arthur K. Wilson will succeed Sir John Fisher as First Sea Lord. The appointment has now been actually made. Sir Arthur Wilson was the first reluctant to accept the post of First

Sea Lord, not being desirous at his time of life—he is 67 years of age—to undertake duties so laborious, so exacting, and perhaps so ungrateful. Happily, however, influences have been brought to bear of a character to which even the most legitimate reluctance must yield. It was felt that continuity of policy had to be guaranteed, and it was considered that Sir Arthur Wilson was well qualified to maintain the Fisher policy—otherwise the business-like way of running the Navy to secure the highest standard of efficiency Sir Arthur Wilson will not take up the position for some time, as Sir John Fisher will not retire until April or May next. Even after that date the nation will not be deprived of his valuable services, as he will remain a member of the Committee of National Defence. Sir John Fisher will on his accession to the peerage take the title of Baron Fisher of Kilverstone.
