SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH. WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of a valuable Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Subagency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Agency on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain pre-emptive may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$500 per acre. Duties:—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The Black Diamond steamer Morwenna, arrived this morning from Montreal and Charlottetown with a large number of passengers and freight for Sydney and North Sydney merchants. The Morwenna after bunkering will sail this evening on her return trip to Montreal. A number of Sydney people are passengers for the Canadian Metropolitan by this steamer today.—Sydney exc.

Of the five schooners and one tug, which went aground on the shores of the harbor during the great storm of Sept. 31st. last there now remains one ashore, the "Swift Current," at the shipyard, and from her position it looks doubtful if she ever will be got into the water again. She is so hard and fast that no attempt will likely be made to float her again.—Sydney exc. (The Swift Current was formerly owned by P. E. I. parties).

Yesterday the S. S. Harland, which arrived the previous evening from Pictou where she had been on the slip receiving a thorough overhauling, was inspected by Messrs Olive and Dalton, of St. John, the Government Steamboat inspectors. These gentlemen found everything in a highly satisfactory condition and complimented Capt McLean on the splendid manner in which his vessel was kept. It went so far as to remark to the Captain that there were but few of the river port and harbor steamers which he had inspected that were in such good shape. While in Pictou the Harland was given attention to every detail in which improvement was found necessary, special attention being paid to the hull. A strip of galvanized iron which extended along the water line from the bow to nearly amidships was lengthened thirty feet. This is three feet in width and the purpose is to give added protection to the hull against floating ice in the early spring and late autumn.

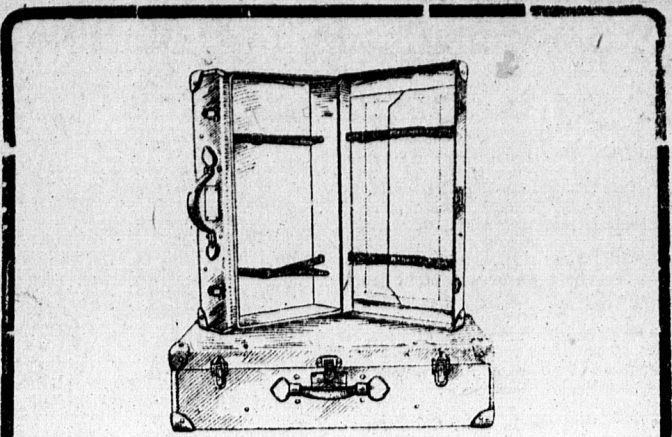

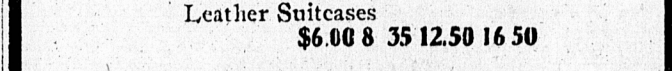
