TIGERS EVEN SERIES DEFEATING CUBS 8-3

Three Chicub Pitchers Unable To Stack - up Against Tommy Bridges

Teams Move To Chicago To Resume Series Today At Wrigley Field. Greenberg Hits Homer In Opening Inning As Bengals Take Four Run Lead.

DETROIT, Oct. 3.—Thomas David Bridges, the Tennessee thunderbolt with the crackling curve, came to the rescue of Detroit Tigers today and hurled them right back into the middle of the coldest battle waged for baseball's world championship in 19 years.

The six-hit pitching of the slim speedball artist, combined with a blast of semi-freezing weather and a first-inning barrage of base-hits, halted the impetuous charge of Chicago Cubs. The final score was 8-3 as the home team opened fire for the first time with their bats and drove the veteran Charley Root to cover with a four-run fusillade climaxed by Hank Greenberg's first homer of the series.

The Tiger triumph squared matters at one game apiece, with the warfare shifting from this frigid battleground to Chicago tomorrow for the next three games. The enthusiasm of the American League champions, along with 46,742 half-frozen cash customers, was cut somewhat short by an injury to the slugging Greenberg, who hurt his left wrist sliding into the plate in the seventh inning.

With his chance, Cochrane shut out, spoiled, Bridges coasted along for the rest of the game and was in difficulty only once, in the seventh, as Billy Herman drove in the last two Cub runs with a looping hit to left.

The Tigers came out of their batting slump with a bombardment that must have echoed all over Detroit, if not the entire country.

The Tigers thumped Root for four successive hits and as many runs. Jo-Jo White lopped a hit to left as a starter. Cochrane lashed a double down the rightfield line, scoring White. Charley Gehring, after being robbed of a home run by the wind that carried his towering drive over the right-field wall in foul territory, smashed a single to centre, scoring Mickey Greenberg, who took a teehold and battered a homer high into the bleacher crowd back of left field.

The only man "out" at this juncture was Root, a veteran of other and celebrated world series bombardments who saw his hopes of a comeback shattered once more. Root has now started four world series games and failed to finish a single one.

When the Tigers are down and out they call on Tommy Bridges to "bridge" the chasm of despair to the high road of hope. Tommy pitched the Tigers into the lead last year by beating the great Dizzy Dean after Elden Auker had tied it up. And he put them back into a tie today by curving icicles around the big bad bears' necks.

"Granddaddy" Root didn't go to the showers. He went to a charcoal stove. Poor Charlie. His record is one of the finest in baseball, yet he has yet to finish a World Series game. He's started in four of them now and has been a "good time Charlie" every time—to opposition batters.

Bridges was such a technical, painstaking workman that he averaged four pitches to a man. He sometimes ran the count to 3 and 2, and sometimes running up two strikes without a ball and sometimes pitching three balls and then three strikes.

Babe Ruth, perched in the press box behind the plate, made the star catch of the game. The bamba stood up and caught a foul off Freddie Lindstrom's bat in the fourth inning. The crowd gave him a big hand and he liked it.
