MILLER'S AGENT WAS J. F. FRASER.

OTTAWA, Feb. 21--J. F. Fraser, who was the Ottawa agent of the Diamond Light and Heating Company of Montreal, and to whom certain moneys now in dispute were paid, according to evidence given by R. C. Miller, Canada's State prisoner, in the hearing on accounting at Montreal, was Superintendent of Lights for Canada in the Marine and Fisheries Department for several years. He was retired as the result of the investigation by Judge Cassell as Civil Service Investigating Commissioner about five years ago.

TOWN DESTROYED BY INCENDIARY.

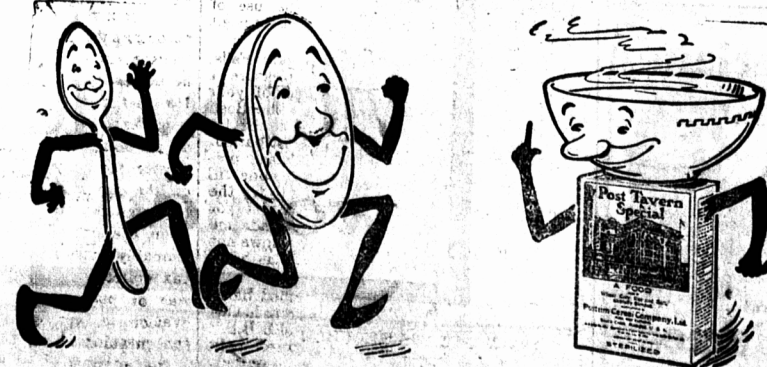

AGED AMHERST MAN RUN OVER BY TEAM AND MAY DIE.

AMHERST, N. S., Feb. 23--A serious accident occurred here tonight about 10.30 which may prove fatal to one of Amherst's well known and old land marks, in the person of Joseph Goodwin, a blacksmith of Amherst for over thirty years. He was crossing Church street near Fuller's corner when an unknown horse and sleigh driving at the usual rate of speed, knocked him down and driving over his body and head, causing a fracture to the base of the skull, and breaking several ribs. The fracture to the skull is of such a nature that the doctors have very little hope of his recovery. At a late hour he was still alive. The unknown party who passed over his body made no effort to help the elderly man to rise but drove right along. The police are making every effort to locate the unknown man.

SERVICE TO MEXICO TO BE ABANDONED.

MONTREAL, Feb. 23--The small passenger and freight service carried on for some years between Canada and Mexico by the Elder Dempster line, employing the steamers Borna and Sokoto in this service, is to be discontinued in April next, so that there will be no longer direct steamship communication during the coming season between Mexico and St. Lawrence ports.

The news of the discontinuance of the Mexican service was announced in the Maritime Provinces on Saturday and was generally attributed in shipping circles there to the outbreak of the revolution in Mexico. This, however, is not the reason. A. E. Cook, of the Montreal offices of the line, communicated with last night, stated that the mail contract with the Mexican Government had terminated on January 2nd last, and had not been renewed, and the contract with the Dominion Government would terminate in April. The Elder Dempster Line is now applying for the renewal of the latter contract as the service has unfortunately not proved sufficiently remunerative in the past to induce them to tender again. Asked as to the destination of the Borna and Sokoto after the termination of the contract with the Canadian Government, Mr. Cooke said they would be sent to England, where other employment would be found for them by the head office of the firm.

RUSSIA READY TO ASSIST BULGARIA

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 22--It is reported that the Russian Black Sea fleet is ready to intervene should Rumania refuse to abide by the mediation of the powers and take aggressive action against Bulgaria. Some anxiety has been caused here by the information that the Rumanians are concentrating cavalry and artillery near Silistria.

FIGHT OF WALL STREET AGAINST ADDED TAX

NEW YORK, Feb. 22--The stock exchange has embarked upon a systematic and comprehensive campaign against the 4% tax on the sale of each 100 shares of stock recently recommended by Governor Sulzer. In addition to enlisting the aid of its employees and those of its members as well as local real estate and insurance interests, bankers in all parts of the state have been requested to communicate with their representatives at Albany protesting against the measure. The entire state is being canvassed. It is proposed to circulate petitions among all classes of people having business in the financial district.

MR. ASTOR ASKS PARTICULARS

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Feb. 20--A motion was made before Justice Motzko today by counsel for William Vincent Astor for a bill of particulars in the action brought against him by Charles E. Palmer for \$25,000 damages for injuries received when Mr. Palmer was run down by Mr. Astor's automobile. Mr. Palmer was on a motorcycle on the Albany post road at Irvington on the Hudson on September 30, 1910, when he was hit by a motor car driven, it is alleged by Mr. Astor, by his left leg and ribs were broken and he was in a hospital for nearly a month. The trial has been delayed owing to the death of John Jacob Astor, who was the original defendant.

MURDER TRIAL AT SYDNEY TODAY.

SYDNEY, Feb. 23--In the Supreme Court the case of the King vs Tom Brian charged with murder comes up tomorrow. The hearing of the case of the three Poles charged with murder--Messrs Malek, Engo and Kojas--was finished and a verdict of manslaughter each was brought in by the jury.
