#### FEARS CANADA WILL GRAB ALL CARBIDE TRADE

WASHINGTON, March 19.—"We are so mad at the Niagara Falls Power Company and the American Carbide Company that we want to smash all of their business, as well as the business of every other concern utilizing water power, and send that business—including a \$4,000,000 a year payroll—to Canada and let Canada profit by it," according to Senator Copeland, New York, debating in the Senate the question of a tariff on carbide.

Copeland wants a one-cent per pound tariff on carbide. Recommendation for such a tariff came from the Senate Finance Committee. In-surgents, led by Senator La Follette, Wisconsin, and Norris, Nebraska, sought to have carbide put on the free list, or if not put there, have the

tariff reduced by one-half. La Follette's proposal to cut the tariff in half was defeated.

#### Fredrick Defeat

Copeland predicted defeat of the La Follette proposal. "I do not believe," he said, "we are going to let Canada have all this business. I know Mr. Norris is too kind-hearted and is too much interested in the welfare of American citizens to permit his feelings regarding the power trust to lead him to vote to reduce this rate and send this business abroad."

"The Union Carbide Company exported 2,500,000 pounds, but of this amount 1,750,000 pounds went to Hawaii, the Philippines and Porto Rico. We exported to foreign countries only 820,000 pounds, while Canada exported last year 9,000,000 pounds."

#### Canada's Possibilities

"Do senators see the great possibilities in Canada? Is there any reason why Canada cannot be exporting all of this commodity to the United States? That is what will happen if we reduce this rate."

Copeland made the plea that the tariff was necessary to keep power company men on the payroll. His assertion was questioned by Senator Berkeley, Kentucky, who declared that the number of men who would be kept on the payroll by such a tariff is insignificant when compared with the number of miners and farmers and others who use the carbide and who will have to sacrifice financially because of a higher tariff.
