of whom are living. She was at all
times an affectionate wife and mo-
ther.

Annual Meeting
Of Baptist Church
At Summerside

The annual meeting of the Sum-
merside Baptist Church was a most
enjoyable and get together affair.
There was a very large attendance
and the members were most inter-
ested in the different reports brought
in.

Before the meeting everyone sat
down to a most delicious supper
which was provided by the ladies.
The tables looked very dainty with
snowy linen, silver and vases of
crimson and pink roses. After full
justice had been done to the boun-
tiful supper, there was a short pro-
gram of praise. Besides several
hymns by the congregation there
were one or two special numbers
which were much appreciated;
reading "Just Living" by Miss Hel-
en Manson; solo, Miss Ruth Sim-
mons, quartette, by Dr. A. L. Mac-
Donald, Dr. A. W. Leard, Mr. Jack
MacLeod and Mr. Edgar Clark.
Prayer closed this most enjoyable
part of the evening.

The business meeting opened with
the reading of the minutes of the
previous annual meeting, by Mr.
Smallman, clerk of the church. The
reports from the different commit-
tees were then brought in. Worthy
of note was the report by Mr. Jelly
that the Men's Bible class had con-
tributed \$50 annually for the last
two years to maintain a school in
India for 29 young boys. This was
at the suggestion of Rev. A. D.
Matheson, missionary of India, who
when on a visit to the Island, asked
for support to provide schools for
boys in India.

Rev. Mr. Wilson gave a short re-
view of the work done in the Church
and stated that it had been a year
of encouragement in spite of many
difficulties. He made a touching
reference to members who had passed
on to their heavenly home during
the past year. The various social
activities of the church showed pro-
gress. The volley ball club, C. G.
I. T. and Trail Rangers all had good
reports. One C. G. I. T. and five
Trail Rangers attended the sum-
mer camp at Canoe Cove last sum-
mer. Fourteen services had been
held in Belmont, Lot 16 Church,
which he was sure was much ap-
preciated by the congregation. He
hoped to continue these services
this year. In closing Mr. Wilson
thanked one and all for the assis-
tance given to him in carrying out
his duties as pastor. A vote of
thanks moved by Mr. C. B. Jelly
and seconded by Dr. MacNeill was
extended to the ladies for the pro-
sperous banquet they had provided
for the ladies in a few gracious words.

The reports were all very en-
couraging and the treasurer's re-

gard to the producers profit, and
added that cooperative marketing
stabilized the market and thereby
benefited trade.

He urged the adoption for the
next few years of branches of farm-
ing having an immediate yield and re-
marked that mixed farming was
the most suitable type for Eastern
Canada.

He stated he was advised that
New Brunswick was cutting out all

lieved the egg and poultry industry

He closed by congratulating the
Association upon their work and

year's work. In his report the Au-
ditor, Mr. R. V. Longworth stated:
"Notwithstanding this being the
second year of great business un-
rest, and the danger of falling mar-
kets, the profit and loss statements
for the year just closed, show a net
profit of \$18,353.49 and points again
to the outstanding business ability
of the Manager, George Leightizer,
and the Secretary, James J. Leight-
izer.

The morning session opened at
9.30 with a registration of dele-
gates followed by the appointing of
resolutions and credential commit-
tees which resulted as follows:

Resolution: James Compton, Ban-
gor, (chairman), James Gill and
E. C. Holm.

Credential: Fred T. Arsenault,
Central Bedeque, (chairman), John
MacKinnon and John J. MacKinn-
on.

The minutes of the last annual
meeting were read by the Secretary
and adopted.

The Auditor's report quoted above
was then presented by R. V. Long-
worth and adopted.

Mr. Frank Timney, Assistant
Superintendent of the Experiment-
al Farm gave an interesting address
on the cost of feed compared with
product on, citing figures from the
Experimental Farm Records from
which the conclusion was drawn
that unless the production amount-
ed to about 150 eggs per hen per
year a reasonable profit could not
be obtained. The figures showed
that the profit increased with the
production until when a production
of 20 dozen eggs per year was reach-
ed the gross profit per hen amount-
ed to about three dollars.

Mr. F. M. Nash, Poultry Promot-
er for the Province believed that
if poultry are kept under sanitary
conditions no trouble from white
darrhoea would occur.

He stated the greatest need in
this Province at the present time
is for better feeding methods. About
two thirds of the poultry raisers are
not feeding enough and production
cannot be maintained without prop-
er feeding.

He referred to the Cockerel Dis-
tribution Policy of the Federal
Government by means of which 125
birds were placed here last year
and urged all farmers to take ad-
vantage of this.

He dealt with diseases of poultry
and advised that suspected birds
should be immediately segregated
from the rest of the flock.

Mr. J. J. McGillivray took an op-
timistic view of the work but stated
that the high production neces-
sary for good profit could not be
obtained by the average farmer.

The Secretary referred to the
Poultry Show being held in the
Nash Show Rooms, Queen Street by
the Prince Edward Island Poultry
Association and recommended that
all should visit it.

The meeting adjourned until 2
o'clock.

Resolutions

The report of the resolution com-
mittee was taken up and after some
discussion a resolution to the ef-
fect that the bonus should be paid
twice a year instead of yearly was
amended and the motion that the
bonus remain a yearly one was
passed by the meeting.

The following resolution after
much discussion was passed.

"Whereas the present depression
is greatly affecting the poultrymen
of this Province and whereas we
are forced to sell our eggs and
poultry at a very low price, and
whereas under present conditions
we cannot carry on if the over-
head of this Association is not re-
duced to a minimum. Be it there-
fore resolved that the incoming
directorate be asked to take this
matter up and if feasible have some
adjustments made to suit present
conditions."

During the discussion Mr. Leight-
izer stated that we have the low-
est overhead of any similar associa-
tion in Canada. He explained the
necessity for paying reasonable
salaries to hold the expert graders
employed. He attributed the low
average price to the seconds and
cracked eggs sent in by a number
of producers.

The presentation of the cup do-
nated by the "Agriculturist" for the
Egg Circle making the greatest im-
provement is the co-operative Egg
and Poultry Association was then
made by Mr. J. J. Enman, Editor
of the Summerside Journal.

The cup was awarded to the
Circle having the greatest increase
in percentage of extras and great-
est gain in membership, to be held
for one year by the member of that
Circle having the highest average
price.

The St. Nicholas Circle Mr.
Philip Arsenault, manager won the
cup on basis of 1930 production. Mr.
Hugh Gamble has the honor of hold-
ing the cup for the first year having
obtained the highest average
price for eggs in the St. Nicholas
Circle-28.2c or 70 points.

In answer to question Mr. Leight-
izer analyzed grading and inspection
methods and procedure in training
egg graders.

try Association.

On behalf of the Directorate and
Management I extend to you a most
heartly welcome to this our Eigh-
teenth Annual Convention.

To the members and managers of
these circles the Directorate ex-
tends sincere thanks and gratula-
tions for their splendid efforts to
promote co-operative effort during
a period of unprecedented adverse
conditions.

Membership Increase

Membership in the Association
increased by the addition of 643
new members including 113 in the
Tryon Circle. The gross member-
ship now being 5,135.

The percentage of Extras receiv-
ed amounted to forty-eight per
cent of total volume, a decline of
five per cent. Bad eggs amounting
to 11,000 dozen were received, this
represents a direct loss to producers
and Association of approximately
\$2,400.00. With greater attention to
details and to the information
furnished members through the me-
dium of the Monthly Poultry Sup-
plement, practically all this loss
could be eliminated, and a better
grade for all other eggs would be
obtained by members.

One carlot of live poultry was
shipped this season, returning an
average price of 14c per pound to
shippers, as markets were dull it
was deemed best to withhold fur-
ther shipments.

The handling of dressed poultry
show a gain of approximately sixty
per cent, quality was exceptionally
good 75 per cent grading Milkfed
A and B. The value of dressed pou-
ltry amounted to \$58,741.79 a new
high level for the Association.

The Community hatchery was
operated as in former years the
object being to supply members
with first quality chicks, rather
than just sell chicks as a commer-
cial proposition. The soundness of
the policy is reflected in the high
quality of dressed poultry handled
by the Association. All pens supply-
ing eggs to the hatchery are peri-
odically inspected, approved male
birds head all pens, sanitary con-
ditions are insisted on, so that we
may send members only healthy
vigorous chicks.

Poultry feeds, brooders and incu-
bators were supplied members at a
minimum price, owing to financial
conditions existing throughout the
Province sales were not as exten-
sive as formerly.

Creditable Showing

The gross turnover for the year
amounted to \$361,704.00 which is
rather a creditable showing when
the low price of eggs and other com-
modities is considered.

Your Directorate wish to thank all
members who have contributed to
the success of our Association, to the
Management, The Press, The De-
partments of Agriculture Federal
and Provincial.

We have just completed one of
the most critical years of our ex-
istence, one that has demonstrated
quite clearly the value of co-opera-
tion and honest effort, as opposed
to the principles of selfishness and
greed.

Whilst Agriculture has had a try-
ing experience it is still the basic
industry of the country. General
prosperity cannot be expected with
wheat at 50c, potatoes at 2c and
pork at 4 1-2c. It is quite evident
that industrialists realize this; the
farmer may soon expect a return
of more equitable conditions.

We look to the future with faith
and confidence, "one swallow does
not make a summer" neither does
a period of low prices and depres-
sion, whatever the underlying causes
may be mean that we give up in
despair and throw our past ef-
forts into the discard.

When a bonus of 7 per cent was de-
clared on value of eggs shipped
during 1931.

Copies of all resolutions passed at
1931 convention were forwarded to
proper authorities, and acknowledg-
ments were received.

Resolution No. 1-Dealing with
standardizing of an egg case for do-
mestic use. This matter is as yet un-
decided. The Deputy Minister of
Agriculture, Ottawa advises that, as
soon as something satisfactory has
been obtained a full report will be
sent to us.

Resolution No. 2-Re change in
By-Laws to provide for entrance fee
has been carried into effect - and
change sanctioned by Order-in-
Council, May 1st, 1931.

Resolution No. 3-Re sanitation of
poultry plants of members. In the
May issue of the Poultry Supple-
ment, specifications of requirements
were published. No reports were re-
ceived from circle collectors regard-
ing any changes or existing condi-
tions of poultry houses, etc.

Resolution No. 4-Re lower freight
rates on coarse grains. Acknowledg-
ment of copy was received from
President of C. N. R. Railways, Sir
Henry Thornton, Mr. R. L. Burnap,
Vice President in charge of all traf-
fic matters, visited Prince Edward
Island, called at our office and dis-
cussed this problem. Up to the
present no change in rates has been
effectuated.

During the past season Mr. F.
M. Nash, District Poultry Promoter,
gave calling demonstrations in
districts where managers asked for
them. Killing, plucking and
grading of poultry demonstrations
were also given. Considerable in-
terest was shown by members in
these demonstrations, but a larger
attendance is urgently needed if
members are to secure greater
knowledge and efficiency in pro-
ducing better quality eggs, and in
properly preparing poultry for
market.

Changing market conditions with
keener competition from other prov-
inces where producers are more
readily adopting improved methods
of poultry husbandry, make it im-
perative that members take full ad-
vantage of all opportunities offered
them to improve local conditions.

The Poultry Supplement sent
members through the medium of
the Prince Edward Island Agricultur-
ist is issued to give important in-
formation on poultry keeping, also
to establish better contact between
members, circle officers, and the
management of the Association.

With increasing competition we
must have a lowering of production
costs, obtained by improved hous-
ing, feeding and breeding methods
in order to obtain maximum pro-
duction per hen.

The plan of placing the blame for
our shortcomings on others will not
effect progress. The old adage that
"each man is no stronger than his
weakest link" applies to a business
or any other kind of an organ-
ization. The "luck" in your Associa-
tion is the individual and on him de-
pends success.
