Fruit Whip

1 1/2 tablespoons gelatin 1 1/2 cups cold water 1/2 cup sugar 1 cup pineapple juice 2 tablespoons lemon juice 1 cup crushed pineapple 1 cup apples, chopped 1/2 cup dates, chopped

Soak gelatin in one-fourth cup cold water five minutes. Mix sugar with remaining water and bring to boiling point. Add gelatin and stir until dissolved.

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
