### Lord Minto and His Ministers at the Train to Bid them Farewell

### SIR WILFRID GOES WITH THEM TO THE COAST

### Amid Booming Cannon the Royal Party Wave Good by from the Rear Platform—Two More Failures in St. John Result from Merritt Bros. Collapse—The Poirier Murder Mystery at Glace Bay Still Unsolved.

#### THE ROYALTIES LEAVE OTTAWA.

OTTAWA, Sept. 24.—(Special).—The Royal Party took their farewell of Ottawa this morning. They had a military escort to the train.

#### NOTABLE PERSONS AT THE STATION.

Lord Minto was at the station as were the Ministers of the Crown and the Civic Reception Committee.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier left with the party for the coast.

#### PARTED AMID BOOMING GUNS.

#### Minutes of Presbytery.

At Charlottetown, and within St. James' Hall, on Thursday September 24th, and at 11 a. m., the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met and was constituted. Mr. J. W. MacKenzie, Moderator, Messrs. Sinclair, McLeod, Spencer, Campbell, Gillis, Stewart, Fullerton, McIvor, Polley, Craie, Herdman, Robertson, D. McLean and McNeill, Ministers, and Duncan McCallum, J. J. McLeod, and T. C. James, Elders.

Took up call from the congregation of Waterford, N. B. to Rev. J. F. Polley, Souris.

The clerk read extracts from the minutes of the Presbytery of St. John, transmitting the call, and appointing Rev. T. F. Fullerton to represent them. He further notified that he had cited the congregation to appear at this meeting for their interest.

Mr. Fullerton addressed the court, pointing out the needs of Waterford, and the strong desire to secure Polley's services. The clerk read a very strong resolution from the congregation of Souris, expressive of the harmonious working of the congregation, and of their deep attachment to Mr. Polley and adding that unless the reasons for Mr. Polley's translation were very weighty that the Presbytery refuse it.

On motion the call was placed in Mr. Polley's hands who signified his acceptance thereof. It was then agreed that the translation be granted, and the pastoral tie dissolved, to take effect after Sabbath Sept. 22. The Presbytery in taking this action, placed on record its deep sympathy with the congregation of Souris and Bay Fortune, in being deprived of some of the services of a pastor to whom they were so loyally attached.

On motion Mr. Craie was appointed interim moderator of the session, and he was instructed to arrange for declaring the pulpit vacant on the first Sabbath of October.

Took up call from Covehead and St. Peters Road, Mr. Fullerton reported that on Sept. 2nd., he had moderated in a call at Covehead which came out in favor of Mr. W. H. Spencer of Montague, that this call was unanimous in Covehead and Brackley Point Road and while not entirely unanimous at St. Peters Road it was almost so, that it was signed by 124 members and 76 adherents and the stipend guaranteed was \$800 with a manse. On motion the conduct of Mr. Fullerton was approved. The following commissioners from the congregation were then heard: R. Munn, Jos. Stewart, David Auld. These all testified to the heartiness of the call and explained that where it was not unanimous it was through no personal objection to Mr. Spencer but to preference for another candidate. On motion the call was sustained as a regular Gospel call.

## AN ACCOMPLICE MAKES CONFESSION

### Detailing the Plot to Murder President McKinley Implicating Emma Goldman

### PLOT HATCHED AT DEWY HOTEL PHILADELPHIA.

### Evidence Concluded at Czolgosz Trial—No Testimony Offered For Defence—Assassin's Relatives Ready to Testify if Wanted—Tragic Stop of the Schley Inquiry—Betting on the Yacht Race 5 to 4 Against the Shamrock

#### AN ACCOMPLICE MAKES CONFESSION.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 24.—(Special).—Ed. Sastig, who was arrested on a charge of larceny and believed to be an accomplice of Czolgosz has made a confession giving details of the plot to assassinate President McKinley.

#### EMMA GOLDMAN IMPLICATED.

He made a confession implicating Franz Harrigan of the Dewey Hotel, Philadelphia who arranged the details, after leaving Emma Goldman and himself.

#### EVIDENCE IN CZOLGOSZ CASE ALL IN.

BUFFALO, Sept. 24.—(Special).—The trial of the assassin Czolgosz was continued to-day and the taking of evidence concluded. NO EVIDENCE FOR DEFENCE.
