ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

The deaths took place in Boston on April 23 of Jos. Stanlake, aged 40 years, native of P. E. I. and in Somerville April 25 of Michael Hason also of this province.

The trains were delayed yesterday afternoon for the members of the House who intended returning to their homes east and west before prorogation. A large number were passengers.

The Louisiana Purchase Exposition or the World's Fair of 1894, had the preliminary opening yesterday (Thursday) as that is the 100th anniversary of the purchase of that state from the French. The President of the United States and his Cabinet, were to be present, and it is expected that 25,000 people would be there.

An Ottawa despatch says: Hance Logon M. P. for Cumberland, who is known as "The Handsome Man" celebrated the 34th anniversary of his birthday on Sunday. He entertained the Commons when he was 27. Next to A. A. Lefurgy, of Prince, P. E. I. he is the youngest member of the House.

THE SESSION'S JOKE.—The joke of the session at Ottawa is the vote by which the House of Commons declared that the manufacture and sale of cigarettes should be absolutely prohibited. Afterwards, when Mr. Fielding, in his Budget speech spoke of the increase of the revenue from cigarettes (1901, \$382,658; 1902, \$400,025) the House broke into laughter. This is a notable characteristic of the House; it smiles when it is acting foolishly and when it votes for political or moral effect rather than for the vindication of an earnestly-held principle. The cigarette and "Home Rule for Ireland" resolutions are examples of actions of which the House is modestly ashamed.—May Canadian Magazine.
