Finance

By Bernard S. O'Hara Associated Press Financial Writer NEW YORK, Sept. 14—(AP)—The stock market last week broke a lengthy stalemate by an eye-lash and leaders Saturday stepped out of the stagnation with advances slightly in the majority.

There was a handful of fairly strong spots in the brief proceedings but plus signs mostly were in minor fractions. Numerous issues were unchanged and minus signs were plentiful at the close. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 1/4 of a point at 43.5 and showed a net gain of as much on the week. A year ago the composite stood at 43.1. Transfers of 230,606 shares were the smallest since Aug. 23, and compared with 243,570 last Saturday. J. I. Case jumped 3 1/8 to 87 1/8. Favored also were Boeing, Douglas Aircraft, Consolidated Aircraft, Aviation Corp., Southern Pacific, Westinghouse, Johns-Manville, Owens-Illinois and Lehigh Valley Coal preferred.

Grain

WINNIPEG, Sept. 14—(CP)—A let-up in support from United States firms and light support from mills failed to offset increased hedging pressure and as a result wheat futures on Winnipeg grain exchange closed Saturday 3-8—1/2 cent down. October wheat finished at 73 1/2, December 75-75 1/8 and May 79 1/4—3/8 cents.

MONTREAL, Sept. 14—(CP)—Slightly higher prices ruled for most industrials during Saturday's short stock exchange session but the residue of issues boarded were irregular. However, trading during the week expanded to the best levels for 1941 and quotations generally showed upward curves.

NEW YORK, Sept. 14—(CP)—The Canadian dollar ended last week 1-8 cent off its finish for the previous week after trading that saw little range Saturday. New York foreign exchange rate for the dollar in relation to United States currency was 10 5-8 cents discount unchanged from the Friday closing figure.

NEW MINISTER ARRIVES—Rev. Douglas Henderson, Bridgewater, N. S., was in the city yesterday enroute to take charge of the Georgetown and Cherry Valley Churches of England. He will commence his duties this week. He succeeds Rev. J. T. Payne who left about a year ago for Guelph, Ontario where he is stationed.

POLICE COURT—One drunk was fined five dollars and costs or ten days in jail at Saturday morning's session of the Police Court here. The case of another man who had been remanded from a previous sitting was dismissed.

PLEAS GUILTY—The case of H. M. Scott of Charlottetown, who appeared before Magistrate Lane Thursday morning charged with attempted fraud by issuing cheques of \$20 and \$20.18 in local stores without sufficient funds, pleaded guilty to the charge, and was remanded until the afternoon session when he was given a suspended sentence of six months on condition that he make restoration and pay the court costs. He was also obliged to post a bond of \$200.—Moncton Times.

RECONSECRATION SERVICES—Reconsecration Week services were held in all the churches in the city and throughout the province yesterday in keeping with the proclamation issued by the government. Appropriate sermons were preached by the clergy and special reconsecration prayers were said. A large military church parade in the morning marked the observance in Charlottetown. A special Reconsecration program was staged in Souris during the afternoon.

DESTROYED BY FIRE—Fire, which converted a 1941 De Soto sedan into a blazing inferno, reduced the machine to a total wreck at West Royalty Saturday afternoon. Only the two front tires were left unscathed after the blaze died out. A short circuit is believed to have been the cause of the conflagration as the owner and driver, Mrs. Elizabeth Lawless, Charlottetown, said the horn started to blow and would not stop. Then the engine burst into flames and the driver and another occupant got out of the automobile. Cpl. C. F. Deakin of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Charlottetown Detachment, who happened to be in the vicinity at the time, noticed the smoke and thought a plane had crashed. He immediately rushed to the scene and discovering the blazing car, rendered assistance. However, nothing could be done to save the doomed vehicle and it was only with difficulty that it was towed off the road and into a nearby field with a horse and cart loaned by a farmer. The policeman took charge and guarded against the explosion of the gasoline tank which occurred later without injuring anybody. The car, which was valued at approximately \$2300, was not covered by insurance, the owner told police. It was a total loss. The accident occurred on a slied road back of the old Upton Airport.

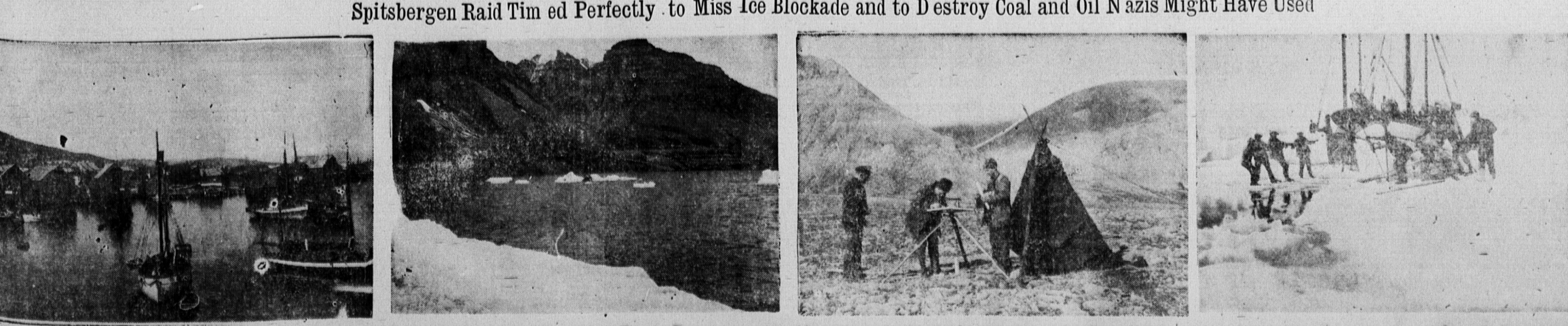
