### TWO MINISTERS SWORN IN.

OTTAWA, Nov. 11.—(Special).—At noon Hon. J. Sutherland was sworn in Minister of Public Works and Hon. Raymond Prefontaine as Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

### A TRANSFER OF DUTIES.

It is understood that at the next session of Parliament some works connected with transportation will be taken from the Public Works and added to the Marine department.

There appears to be an apathy among the people and our Divisions have suffered to a large extent as some noble workers in our order whose who count no sacrifice of personal ease and inclination too dear if they can only maintain and uphold their beloved Division.

I have been pleased to receive quite a number of reports from the Deputies but the most part of them seem to be somewhat discouraged by the difficulties they have to contend against, chief among which is the non-enforcement of the Scott Act and Prohibition Law.

This report was on motion given to the Committee on the State of the Order.

The Great Treasurer read his report which was handed over to the Finance Committee.

The following resolution was moved by Bro. James Howard, seconded by B. C. D. Rogers and unanimously carried.
