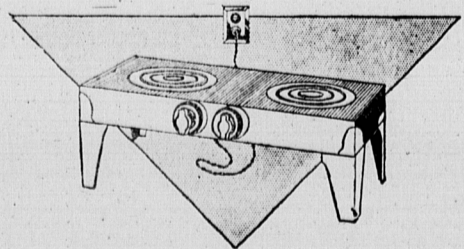

At Rotary

Mr. D. F. Moriarty, Secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, was the speaker at Rotary yesterday and dwelt at length with the object of the Sabbath during all ages, pre-Jewish and Christian.

In no country, said the speaker, "is the Sabbath more observed than in Canada, and in no part of Canada quite as well as it is observed in Prince Edward Island. Essentially and virtually the observance of The Lord's Day as a day of rest and reflection is connection with the Church and higher institutions. Organized society, our very needs and nature, call for such a day. The Christian Sabbath is a day of remembrance, rest and worship, and should be observed in the interest of the whole personality, body, mind, social and spirit.

The danger of commercializing this priceless heritage, of perverting it into a holiday devoted to pleasure is very great and should be opposed by all those who recognize the day as one for a "Breathing space for the spirit."

Civilization does not progress of its own accord and the object of the Alliance is to create and foster legal and educational appreciation of the Sabbath. To permit Sunday to become purely a holiday would be a national calamity.

The speaker was listened to with deep attention and Mr. G. F. Hutcheson who presided, extended the thanks of the club to Mr. Moriarty.

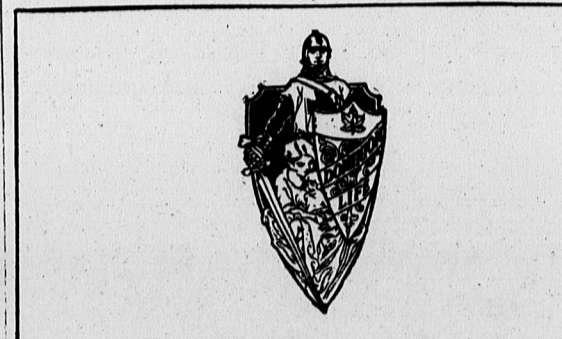
