Dear Mrs. Proutie. Almost every day, at least two or three times during each tour in the trenches we have to lay aside one of our brother workers. It was our sad duty last week to lay to his last long rest your son H. D. Proutie.

I might say that he was particularly sad to me. Ever since I have been attached to the 43rd I have been more or less connected with him in my work and always found in him a man whom I could trust with any mission.

In old 14 platoon of the original battalion I had him with me and when he came to France I immediately asked for him in the Machine Gun Section, where he was serving at the time of his death.

Mrs. Proutie I sympathize with you in your great bereavement and hope that you fully realize the greatness of the cause for which he died.

"Greater love has no man than he lay down his life for his friends."

His body was laid to rest within the sound of guns in a beautiful woods, known as Maple Copse, our regimental Chaplain officiating.
