U.S. Senate Will Ratify Conference Treaty

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Now that the American Congress is nearing an end, the impression is growing here that the various treaties will be ratified. Enough Senate democrats are showing signs of abandoning their opposition to the non-ratification of the Anglo-French Eastern problems, which many had not expected, is a large factor in favor of ratification, according to the news voiced by Senate leaders today.

No Hats At Wedding Of Princess Mary

LONDON, Feb. 4.—The regulations prescribed the costumes to be worn at the wedding of Princess Mary contain a provision contrary to church regulations. The women guests, it has been decreed, will wear elegant gowns without trains and veils for the features. This is interpreted to mean that there will be no head covering and officials in the ceremonial department to the Lord Chamberlain's office say that the regulations undoubtedly intend that the women come with their heads uncovered.

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Poland to Elect First President

WARSAW, Feb. 4.—Poland, politically, is eagerly looking forward to a summer election when the first president of the new republic will be chosen by a national assembly composed of representatives of both chambers of the Diet.

Joseph Pilsudski, who was appointed chief of state just after Poland was declared a republic late in 1918 and has held office ever since under a provisional constitution, is understood among politicians to be one of the presidential candidates.
