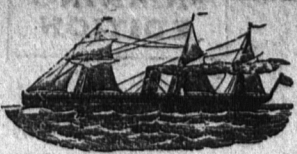

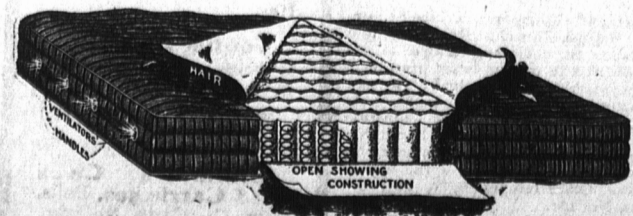

**ART ASSOCIATION.**

St. John Sun.  
Yesterday afternoon a very enjoyable reception was given by the St. John branch of the Woman's Art Association of Canada at their rooms in the McLaughlin building, Union street, in honor of Mrs. Dignam of Toronto, the head of the order in Canada.

The rooms were decorated with white lilies and other white flowers, and presented a very pretty appearance. Ice and other cold refreshments were served, and as the day was very warm, were much appreciated.

The guests were received by Mrs. Silas Alward, the president of the St. John branch, and Mrs. Dignam, and a large number were present. All who attended were interested and delighted by the talk given by Mrs. Dignam, who has come to the maritime provinces to assist in organizing new branches of the association and to help on the work of those already in existence.

Mrs. Dignam said the work was divided into three parts: First, Reviving such primitive arts as spinning, dyeing, weaving and lace making, which have become almost extinct among the people. In the course of her remarks on this part of the work she pointed out the possibilities of art in helping to develop Canadian industries. She advised the members of the local association to look into the pioneer industries of this province with a view of reviving them, and told how they had been revived in other parts of Canada. Mrs. Dignam had a number of beautiful samples of the work done by French-Canadian, English, Indian and Doukhobor women, which were passed around and very much admired.

Secondly there was the educational work of the association. Lectures were held, artistic work of various kinds was engaged in by the members, and exhibitions of beautiful things were held by the various branches to which the public were invited. By this means it is hoped to awaken public thought, increase the love of the people for the beautiful and supply an atmosphere of art.

The handicrafts made up the third division of the work. These are found most interesting and comprise such studies as book binding, wood carving and iron work.

After Mrs. Dignam had finished her lecture and various questions had been asked by the members who appeared to be filled with fresh enthusiasm, the gathering broke up.

The Woman's Art Association of Canada, was started about twenty years ago and has grown with great rapidity and there are at present branches in all the large cities of Canada. Great interest has been taken in its work in Great Britain, Europe and the United States. The St. John branch was started in 1895 and has done good work.

**HISTORIC REPORT.**

With reference to the personnel of the committee of the House of Commons of 1883 which cited expert testimony, examined documents and reported that "in mid-winter no steamer could be built which would keep up continuous communication with the Mainland," Edward Hackett, Ex. M. P. for West Prince writes: "The present Senator Wood (then M. P. for Westmoreland, N. B.) was a member of the committee and the late Judge McIsaac (then M. P. for Antigonish, N. S.) was the other Mainlander. From the island besides myself and Dr. McIntyre, Dr. Jenkins, M. P. for Queen's was a member of it for a short time and Mr. A. C. McDonald may have been on it for a time. What is certain, Messrs. Wood and McIsaac and myself served through and reported to the Government after a careful examination of the case from all available data."

**GOVERNMENT RAILWAYS IN INDIA AND CANADA.**

There is a very wide contrast between the paying qualities of the Government railways in India and Canada. India has some 27,000 miles of railway of which 20,000 miles, or something more than the total railway mileage of Canada, is under the direct ownership and control of the state. The cost of these roads was about \$45,500 per mile, and for the Indian Government mileage a total of about \$900,000,000. Down to the year 1900 they were run at a loss, that is they did not pay the interest on their cost and running expenses, but since that date they have paid a net revenue of \$22,000,000. The net revenue now increases yearly.

Contrast this with the Government railways of Canada which since 1888 have sunk, on an average about \$222,160 a year, besides the interest on their cost. The State railways in India are reported to be now paying their operating expenses and 2 1/2 per cent interest on their cost. In India the net revenue is increasing from year to year. With us the deficits are rapidly increasing. Such a contrast is disheartening, but it is capable of explanation, at least in part. India has a vast population in proportion to her railway mileage and though the masses do not each use the railway so much as our people, there are sixty times as many of them to each mile of railway as there are in Canada. As a consequence there is a much greater traffic on the Indian railways than on the Canadian railways.

Moreover as the development of railways in India has been under Government control, the entire system has been laid out to supply the country's needs. There are few useless or non-paying sections, and in no case are two roads built where one can carry the traffic. India is, moreover a compact country compared with the settled portion of Canada, which has almost interminable length and very little breadth. Furthermore there are no winter snows to be encountered in India. Finally there is no politics as we know it in India to interfere with either the work of laying out new railways or with their operation when built. If railways had been built in Canada by the best routes and only where they are needed, and were managed economically we might have a very much less mileage fully supplying the country's reasonable needs and paying good dividends.
