There were stately Moors in flowing robes chequered with half-naked blacks from the Sus and Draa; lean enduring Arabs in their spidery djellabas rubbed shoulders with Berbers from the highlands in black camd-hair cloaks; there were Levantine Turks, and Jewish refugees from Spain, ostentatiously dressed in European garb, tolerated there because bound to the Moor by ties of common suffering and common exile from that land that once had been their own.
