CANADA MARKET OF GERMAN AIRPLANES.—That German-made mercantile airplanes are being laid down in Canada while British manufacturers are being forced to close their factories owing to lack of support, was the amazing statement made at the annual popular lecture of the Engineering Institute of Canada in the Ottawa Victoria Museum. Officials of the Aero Club, Toronto, expressed surprise at the statement made in Ottawa by Colonel E. W. Stedman, A.R.C.S., chief technical officer of the Canadian Air Board, that German mercantile airplanes are being laid down in Canada. Nevertheless, they say that the statement must be true if it is made by such a responsible officer. Capt. A. J. Hember, when interviewed, said: "Colonel Stedman is an authority on the subject, although it is news to me. We know that several British aeroplane manufacturers have sent representatives to Canada and they have gone through the Dominion from coast to coast. All of them have gone back without receiving any encouragement."
