DOMINIONS ROYAL COMMISSION—The Dominions Royal Commission, the members of which reached England by the Canadian Northern liner Royal Edward, and the Allan liner Virginian, will meet during the course of the present week to consider their next step, whether to issue a final report, or to suspend their duties sine die. Lord d'Abernon, the chairman, who had booked his passage to Canada via New York for the first week in August, cancelled his sailing at the last moment.

RIFLE TROPHY—In the window of Ritchie's bookstore, Queen's Square, there is in view a beautiful silver trophy which is to be presented to Mr. G. Russell Beer. It was subscribed for by a few members of the Civilian Rifle Club and some other of his friends who desire to express tangibly their appreciation of Mr. Beer's wonderful performance of making the perfect score of 105 points at 200, 500 and 600 yards in July last. The trophy is in the form of a Grecian vase, standing over a foot high and mounted on an ebony pedestal, and it bears the following inscription: "Civilian Rifle Club, Charlottetown, P. E. I. Presented to G. R. Beer for making the possible score of 105 points out of 21 shots at 200, 500, 600 yards, July, 1914."

FROM BOSTON—Mr. Chester Acorn, of the Maritime Fox Exchange and Investment Company, has returned to Charlottetown from Boston, Mass., where he had spent on a short visit. The cost of living in Boston, says Mr. Acorn, has advanced at least 50 per cent., sugar being 9 cents per pound, flour \$8 per barrel and meat from 40 to 50 cents per pound. The offices which handle securities have closed down, and factories, owing to the difficulty they experience in procuring material, have been obliged to discontinue operations. Although the newspapers are insisting upon the advantages which will accrue to the United States as a result of the war, the American industries do not appear to be very active, and hardship, declares Mr. Acorn is evident. The outlook in Boston for the coming winter, he thinks, is decidedly gloomy and he is glad to be back again to the comparative comfort of Charlottetown life.

NEWPORT—Harvesting has already begun in this very busy center. The grain crop is exceptionally good. The people here are becoming more jubilant as the Newport steam ferry is nearing completion. It is hoped their joy will reach its climax this coming autumn. Another of the many conveniences and advantages that Newport possesses is a telephone system that our respected pastor Rev. G. J. G. McDonald was instrumental in having established, which will make vocal communication possible with all the surrounding towns and cities. So Newport has every chance and will undoubtedly become a city of commercial importance. Miss K. Steele, who has been visiting her parents here is soon to return to Boston where she has an excellent position. The woods were never in better condition in this district. Mr. R. A. Campbell our roadmaster, deserves praise. The district school is very satisfactory this year under the judicious management of Mr. Farrell, who enjoys a widespread reputation as a successful teacher and student. Mr. Philip Sloane is building a new dwelling house.

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A NARROW ESCAPE—The Belfast congregation came near losing their church property a few Sundays ago when a defective lamp took fire. The sexton rushed for material to smother the flame, but before same could be got the oil fell in a burning mass to the floor. In a moment the wainscoting, railing, curtain, etc., became involved. With the help of the church people, who rushed to the scene and used various devices such as sand, old brooms and plenty of noise, the venerable building has yet a fair chance of reaching the century mark, as it was built ninety years ago, but one minute more and that chance would have been lost. Considerable damage was done but the trustees are pleased that Hyndman & Co., of Charlottetown, lost no time in putting things all right.
