## SUM'SIDE AND WEST.

### The Latest News From Prince County

E. P. STAVERT, of Summerside, P. E. I. is at the Victoria.—St. John Telegraph.

Miss Daisy Williams of Bideford returned home today after a few days visit to friends in Summerside.

Messrs. Lester Sharp, Roy Holman and Stewart McArthur, are home from the P. W. C. for a short visit.

Miss Carrie Mills returned home Saturday evening from a month's visit to friends in Queen's County.

THE train from Charlottetown due here on Friday evening, which remained snow-bound at Fredericton all night, did not reach Summerside until shortly after 6 o'clock Saturday evening, after snow-fighting all day. It left again shortly after a ven, and went as far as Emerald to connect with the regular train which came from Charlottetown in the morning, and which was sent to Cape Traverse instead of coming through to Summerside. It returned again and leaves as usual for the east this morning. The western train which left Summerside on Friday at 2 p. m., was stuck at O'Leary, where it remained all night and did not reach Tignish until shortly before 7 o'clock Saturday evening.

The following additional particulars have been received in regard to the death of Christopher Smith: After a lingering illness which he bore with Christian fortitude, Christopher Smith passed peacefully away at his home in Searletown on the morning of Feb. 28th, 1901, aged 71 years. Deceased was born in Crapaud in 1830 but has lived in Searletown for over thirty years. He has always been a consistent member of the Methodist church, and was respected and loved by both old and young for his exceedingly kind and cheerful disposition. A widow, two sons, and three daughters are left to mourn the loss of a dutiful husband, a kind and affectionate father. Two brothers and four sisters of the deceased are still living, viz: Rev. Matthew Smith, aged 87 years, of Annagance, N. B. Isaac Smith, Esq. Crapaud; Mrs. John L. Wright, Tryon; Mrs. Matthew Lowther; Mrs. David Lowther of Searletown, and Mrs. Edward Rogerson, Crapaud.

THERE is a great demand this year for mussel mud and diggers in our harbor cannot fill all the orders which are coming in from the country. Just now they are working under a great disadvantage because of the bad traffic on the ice, which is covered with from five to ten inches of lolly besides considerable snow; and after each storm, which have been quite frequent of late, the road from the diggers to the railway is almost impassable, each day it being necessary to plow a track all the way. If the present weather continues the farmers will be obliged to wait for some time for their mud, for during the past three weeks, there has been only about eight days work done. The shipments this season are larger than in former years, which shows that this manure is being used more and more each year. In the eastern part of Summerside harbor there are at least 30 men employed and about as many teams engaged in the work. The railway authorities this year made a reduction of from 25 to 50 cents per car load for conveyance to points along the railroad which no doubt assisted in bringing about the boom in mud hauling this year.
