P. E. I. RIFLE TEAM WIN INTER-MARITIME SHOOT

The Home Team Added Fresh Laurels To P. E. Island Yesterday At The Rifle Range By Defeating New Brunswick And Nova Scotia In The Inter-Maritime Shoot And Establishing A New Record Of 763 beating Their Old Mark Of 762 Made in 1911.

Yesterday was a banner day in the lives of P. E. Island Riflemen when their team won the Inter-Maritime Rifle meet from the crack shots of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia on the Kensington Range and also by establishing a new record beating their own mark made in 1911 by one point finishing strong with a total of 763.

This is the first win by the home team since 1914 and needless to say they were elated over the outcome of the shoot and the magnificent scores put on by every member of the team.

Cap. E. C. Shaffer of the Nova Scotia team was leading scorer of the day with 100 points out of a possible of 105. Serg. H. R. McLaughlin of the New Brunswick team finishing second with 99 points and Serg. G. G. McLennan third with 98 points. Serg. McLennan make a remarkable score when one considers his placing of a bull's eye on the wrong target which, had it landed in the same place on the right target would have given him the highest score of 103.

On looking over the scores of the three teams, each one came through with remarkable scores and it surely is a proud sensation to be numbered on the winning team in yesterday's matches, as both New Brunswick and Nova Scotia have marksmen on their team of a very high calibre.

At 200 yards the P. E. Island team was leading with 254, Nova Scotia second with 250 and New Brunswick third with 248.

At the 500 yards the Nova Scotia team stepped into the lead with 257 points, P. E. Island third with 253 and New Brunswick third with 248.

It was at the 600 yards that P. E. Island again shot out in front and finished with 256, Nova Scotia 248 and New Brunswick 239.

Last night at the Armories the visiting teams were tendered a banquet in their honor.

La-Col. H. M. Davison acting as toastmaster and arising proposed a toast to the King, which was responded to by all joining in singing "God Save the King" after which in a few well chosen remarks welcomed the visitors to the Island, speaking in glowing terms of their sportsmanship both on and off the range and complimenting them on their splendid shooting.

He then called on Lt.-Col. R. B. Simmonds, Captain of the Nova Scotia team and the Captain responded with a splendid speech, first giving all praise to the winners on their magnificent achievement on the range and as jolly good fellows. Before taking his seat he thanked the Provincial Rifle Association for the wonderful manner in which their teams were being treated.

Major W. A. Weeks, Captain of the New Brunswick team and formerly a resident of Charlottetown followed with a nice witty speech and adding although a stranger to Charlottetown he desired on behalf of himself and team mates to extend his heartfelt thanks to the Association and the splendid performance of their team on the Rifle range.

SPLENDID MEETING AT ST. GEORGES

Premier Stewart And His Colleague Mr. Howard Macdonald Given An Excellent Reception. Meeting Very Satisfactory From Conservative Standpoint.

The joint meeting at St. George's Fifth District of Kings, on Tuesday night was largely attended and very satisfactory, at least to the Conservative Candidates, Premier Stewart and Mr. Howard Macdonald presided over by Mr. R. J. McMillan.

The first speaker was Hon. J. D. Stewart, Premier. He was greeted with genuine and hearty applause as he rose to address the meeting. He reviewed the record of the past four years, comparing it with the previous four years under Liberal rule, proving to the great evident satisfaction of those present, the majority of those present, after his masterly review, he left it to the judgment of his audience whether in the light of his pre-election promises and their fulfillment and the general record of the government, whether in their judgment the Conservative party were entitled to a further lease of power.

The next speaker was Mr. Saville, one of the Liberal candidates. Mr. Saville complained of the election being held in June, but neglected to explain why. As the 25th of June comes between cropping and haying and is the most beautiful time of the year, the farmers failed to understand the complaint.

He gave some criticism of the record of the Stewart Government, saying among other things that the Premier had not mentioned some grievances that existed in connection with certain roads, and also the one-end break on the Newport ferry. Speaking of government control versus prohibition he said "I have no objection to a man of his house and I believe that the doctors' prescriptions should be cut out entirely. The audience laughingly approved of this sentiment."

Mr. Howard Macdonald followed. Taking up the complaints voiced by Mr. Saville he reminded the latter that the Conservatives had built the docks in connection with the Newport Ferry, that the Liberal government let them go adrift and that when the Conservative party came into power they had the Spurr, W. L. L. docks restored and the present ferry boat put on the route. With reference to Mr. Saville's temperance policy Mr. Macdonald failed to see how Mr. Saville's policy would size up with the prohibition policy of his party. The cutting out of doctors' prescriptions from the present Liberal prohibition evidently meant free rum, probably one of Mr. Saunders' ideas about making his prohibition policy more workable. These remarks by Mr. Macdonald were greeted with loud applause.

The next speaker was Mr. P. A. Cully. He was somewhat nervous and his first remark was an apology to the meeting that he was unable to reply to Premier Stewart. He supported Mr. Saville on the Prohibition question. His speech was very short, and the rest of his time to Mr. Wade Hughes, who explained that he had been called on in a hurry and had forgotten some important papers and was therefore not in a position to speak as he would like to. He gave a few criticisms of the Stewart Government but failed to point out anything worthy of criticism.

Premier Stewart, during the ten minutes accorded him at the close convincingly replied to all the criticism offered by the Liberal speakers. He moved a vote of thanks to the chairman, seconded by Mr. Saville and also thanked the audience for the excellent and orderly meeting.

St. Georges has always been noted for its orderly meetings, and the speakers receiving a good and respectful hearing.
