THE regular monthly meeting of the Caledonia Club of P. E. I., will be held in MacEachern's Hall tonight at eight o'clock.



CURRENT EVENTS. In the reference made yesterday to the competition on Current Events by an error of the types the word "not" was omitted, entirely reversing the intended meaning. REV. R. BRECKEN, President of the M. B. and P. E. I. Conference, takes a decided stand on the prohibition question in a letter to The Christian Guardian and advises "the press, pulpit, the churches, and the temperance majorities in the constituencies to press upon their representatives in Parliament the duty of giving effect to their wishes as far as possible. Something may be done in a private measure, which the government, upon reflection, would not oppose. "Turn out party after party," he says, "until they recognize that they are servants and representatives, and the will of the people is law."

ON March 22nd at St. Peter's Bay before Stipendiary Blanchard Prosecutor Bears obtained two convictions against Jane Dingwell, of Morrell for a second offence and for keeping liquor for sale. She was fined \$150, and costs. Her doors were locked and barred against the constable for some time when a search warrant was obtained which enabled constables McKerron and Ferguson to break in and seize their papers and seize some liquors which they found. Mrs. Dingwell did not face the court, but confessed, after which Stipendiary Blanchard imposed the fines and ordered the liquors to be destroyed. This was accordingly done by constable McKerron. This lesson should be sufficient to teach this persistent violator of our laws that Prosecutor Bears is in dead earnest and that her only chance is to quit the contemptible business she is engaged in. Let all others rumblers in Kings county take warning and get out of their dangerous traffic and become good citizens and so escape a similar affliction of the law.—Com.



YESTERDAY forenoon, at the Police Court, Bell, for using abusive and insulting language towards Robert Davis, was fined \$5 or 30 days. James A. McIntyre, arraigned on charge of being drunk and incapable, was further remanded until that day week. McIntyre's wife laid information against him charging assault and battery, which will also be investigated on Monday next. The details of the information show that for the past seventeen years Mrs. McIntyre and her children have been subjects of the most cruel and inhuman treatment at the hands of the husband, and to avoid her husband's onslaughts she has on several occasions had to make her escape from the house through a window and seek shelter at a neighbor's residence, clad only in such garments as she could throw upon her in her haste.

THE Victoria B. C. Colonist says that the congregation of Calvary Baptist church, from the pastorate of which Rev. Ralph Trotter recently resigned to go to the Boundary Creek country, last evening extended a unanimous call to Rev. J. A. Gordon, M. A., pastor of the Main street Baptist church of St. John, N. B., the salary being \$1,500 a year. Rev. Mr. Gordon is looked upon as one of the strongest ministers in the Maritime Province, he having been very successful in every field which he has worked, and in each way the means of largely increasing the congregation, building new churches and leaving his charges in splendid standing financially and otherwise. Before going to St. John he was at Yarmouth, N. S., and previous to that at Charlottetown, P. E. I. Three years ago the British Columbia congregation extended him a call to take the position of superintendent of missions and he would have accepted but for the fact that his congregation had just completed a new church at a cost of \$30,000 and he did not consider it fair to leave them until the building had been paid for. He is very anxious to come to British Columbia and has four sons, two of whom are graduates of Eastern universities, who are desirous of coming west. The decision of the congregation was telegraphed to Mr. Gordon last evening, but it is not expected that he will send an answer until he receives the secretary's letter giving particulars.
