CANADA AND THE MOTHER AND

Sir,—I take from the Patriot of Saturday the following telegram being a portion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's speech delivered at a Liberal gathering in Toronto on 22nd inst.

Canada's position in the war is an important factor. We have stepped into this war voluntarily. The constitution of 1867 under which we live left us owing nothing legally to the Motherland but we are British subjects and by the impulses of our hearts rather than by the compulsion of laws we have driven wholeheartedly into this conflict.

It is amazing that a man so prominent and of such experience could utter such nonsense, and it only shows the public what little real loyalty the man possesses. If France was not in the present war with England, you would no doubt have heard very different opinions from him, such as he gave expression to when the Boer War took place.

The youngest school boy knows that when England is at War, Canada is at War, and if the Germans were victorious Canada would know it, even if Canada had not sent man or a gun on a ship to the battlefield.

At the Baptist Church Sunday night Rev. Z. L. Fash preached a powerful sermon to a large congregation. The text was Matt. 23:23, 27, "Thou knowest... thou oughtest therefore." There are many of us who share the desire of the man who said, "I wish I could be wound up to go right all day." We begin the day with the best resolves, but somehow they get broken. The true man sighs for something to keep him right many a time when he has fallen where he least expected it. There is one street in Charlottetown that I want to live on as long as I am here, and that is the street called Straight. I don't want to live on Crooked street. Do you? I want my business methods and my pleasures to be honest and right. The Apostle Paul dwelt in Damascus immediately after his conversion on the street that is called Straight, and it was there that he got his eyes opened. While abiding there he felt the force of God's Imperative. He found something on that Street that kept him right all day long. He put himself under God's Imperative. It was failure to do his that brought rebuke upon the wicked and slothful servant. "Thou knowest... thou oughtest therefore."

It is true the knowledge of this servant was imperfect, partial, prejudiced, but by his own knowledge he was judged. The other servants had joyfully put their Lord's talents to good use and so made a good report. They did their duty and were commended. But this other servant loved deeply. But this other servant had a wrong conception of his Lord. He thought him a harsh man. This must have grown out of his own heart and in some way have been a reflection of himself. The servant was himself a churl and so accused his Lord. He was wilfully ignorant of the true character of the Master he was serving. And yet his master held him accountable for the right use of what he did know and also for what he did not know. He should have known the true character of his Lord. He was not excused from holding himself aloof from his Master because he had a wrong idea of his character. There is one thing that our Master will not tolerate—waste of opportunity, keeping his money hoarded, neglecting to keep the most of things, unprofitableness. Indolence is wicked, because it is selfish. God's Imperative came to this servant through his distorted vision. He could not escape his responsibility. "Thou knowest... thou oughtest therefore."

CENSORSHIP IS STILL MORE STRICT

LONDON, May 28.—The government has decided to regulate more strictly the prohibition of war news. It was announced that in order to prevent disclosure of information or publication of statements in the press which might assist the enemy or cause interference with the successful prosecution of the war, the director of public prosecution in England and Wales, the lord advocate in Scotland, and the attorney general in Ireland would be charged with the duty of "instituting proceedings in the event of the infraction of the defence of the realm act by publication of prohibited matter."
