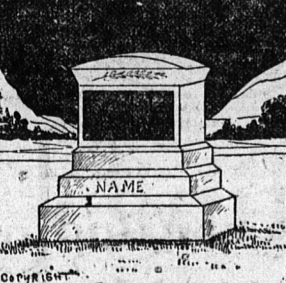

Railway, Charlottetown, writes as follows to his sister, telling of meeting with his brother, from whom no word had been received for six years:— Battalion 105. Regt. No. 712141. Stationed at WITLEY CAMP. Date, 14-12-16. Canadian Expeditionary Force. Dear Sister—

I am writing you a few lines to let you know that I saw Jim. I was on pass to Scotland. I was at Leith a day when he met me on the street. He is looking fine. He was over to France in the Strathcona Horse and was wounded in the leg and is all right now. He has been discharged from the army and is working in the navy docks, where he has a good job. He said he was going home in the spring and said he was going to write home the night I left him. I was there for six days and had a good time with him. He took me all over Leith and Edinburgh. I will send you some postals. I was in London for a day but

did not see much as it was raining. Most of the boys have gone to France but I guess I will not get over till spring. I got your parcel of socks and cigs, but did not get any Xmas parcels yet. I have not got much time to write as the big mail is coming in now; so I guess I will have to close. Good-bye, with love to all. Your brother, LOU.

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RUSSIANS CAPTURE HUNDREDS OF PRISONERS

CARRANZA BUYING MUNITIONS IN JAPAN

TOKIO, Jan. 6.—It is reported that Colonel Carpio and two representatives of General Carranza are now in Japan with the object of purchasing ammunition, rifles, artillery and a steamship. They are said to have been negotiating for the 3,000 ton vessel Kotspira Maru, which recently was chartered by the newly formed Kwat-suda Shipping Company.
