## Steps Taken To Rebuild Max Baer For Title Bout With Louis In September

NEW YORK, June 26 (AP)—Discarding for the time being at least the claims of Max Schmeling for a "rubber" match with Joe Louis, negro heavyweight champion, promoter Mike Jacobs took definite steps Saturday to rebuild Max Baer as the next title challenger.

Jacobs came to terms with Baer and the California's Manager Andy Hoffman on a contract giving the promoter a three-year exclusive right to control Baer's fight services. A public signing of papers took place at Long Beach, N. J., where Baer was trained for many of his fights.

Jacobs plans to put Louis and Baer into the ring this September. The date and place will be left open for bids and ballyhoo. San Francisco would like to stage the fight if it could be put off until the spring of 1939 as a feature of a big fair there, but the choice probably will rest between New York and Chicago for this year.

Baer is one of the five former heavyweight champions among the knocked victims of Louis. He was flattened in four rounds in 1935 at the Yankee stadium in a match that grossed more than \$1,000,000 from all sources. A return match might not do so well, financially, but it's the nearest thing to a local match in sight, the promoter believes.

Mike Jacobs meantime tossed cold water on Schmeling's prospect for another bout with the man who hit him in a hospital with a cracked back after a one-round knockout last Wednesday.

Joe Jacobs, Schmeling's American agent, emerged from a visit with Max in the hospital to declare "negotiations" already were underway for a return bout in 1939 "in behalf of promoter Mike Jacobs it was said that no promises or assurances of any kind had been given Schmeling."

Schmeling's condition was so satisfactory Polyvaline Hospital announced no further bulletins will be issued.

## All Star Team Of American League Named

CHICAGO, June 26 (AP)—The American League cast for baseball's annual all-star game to be played July 8 at Cincinnati was selected today and for a sixth time Lou Gehrig and Charley Gehringer, two of the game's most enduring stars were awarded choice roles.

Vernon (Lefty) Gomez of New York Yankees was the only pitcher named the sixth time. He had hurling assignments in all but the 1936 game.

Every club in the junior circuit is represented on the team which will battle the National League all-stars in the sixth annual "dream" contest. The team membership was announced by the American League president, William Harridge.

## Canadian Tennis Stars Conceded 'Fighting Chance' Against Japanese Squad

FOREST HILLS, N.Y., June 26 (C.P.)—Deeply tanned from the sun and in top physical condition, four young men today continued preparing themselves on the championship grass courts of the West Side Tennis Club to carry Canada's renewed challenge into the international battle for the Davis Cup.

As their games draw finer each day, confidence grows that they have a "fighting chance" to upset the Japanese team in their first-round clash at Montreal July 28-29-30.

Most enthusiastic over Canada's chances in her first since 1934 is 26-year-old Ross Wilson of Toronto who considers the team has an "excellent chance of beating Japan" and going on to meet the winners of the Australia-Mexico series.

The other three members, Laird Watt, Jr., and Bobby Murray of Montreal and Doug Cameron of Vancouver, all figure it's a good idea for Canada to return to Davis Cup competition. They said their team is in fine condition and if Japan wins, they will have no alibi.

The Canadians have been here since last Tuesday. They impress spectators by their steadiness and clean shots as they work out daily for four hours, playing both singles and doubles. They will remain at Forest Hills until next Thursday when they plan to compete in the Nassau invitation tournament at Glen Ove, L.I.

Unless their non-playing captain, E. H. Leframbols of Montreal calls them back to Canada, the players hope to compete in the Maryland championships at Baltimore starting July 11. With this experience gained the young men considered they would be ready for a severe test.

Unable to hold her first three service games and trailing 1-5, Queen Helen, in her own calm, fashion, suddenly took command of play in her fourth round match with Mrs. Bobbie Heist Miller, blistered the South African star's backhand with hard spinning drives and won out at 8-6, 6-4.

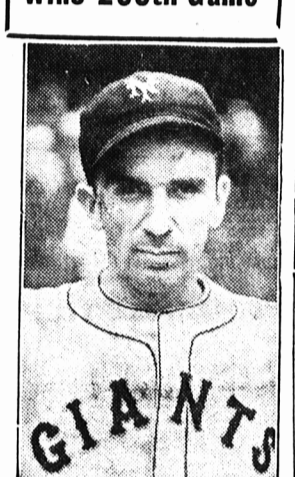
