The following has been received by Mrs P. D. Howatt of Tryon, a niece of the deceased. A brother of the deceased is John Byrton, Tryon; and George Byrton now in Carleton, is a nephew as is also the Rev. R. Byrton, a Baptist minister, now in New Brunswick. "Born of English parents in Tryon, Prince Edward Island, June 10th, 1828, a good man, Alfred Augustus Byrton, the friend of God and of his fellows, died in Holywood in the early morning of February 12th. Mr. Byrton was a printer from childhood, having worked at his trade in Charlottetown, a writer and editor by profession, and industriously followed his calling to the end of his life. He was first married to Miss Adelaide Love of Charlottetown, and then in 1854, he married Miss Marcella Rand of New Brunswick. Canada, who survives him in much weakness but with faith, hope and love. Of the nine children born to Mr. and Mrs. Byrton the following are now living: Mrs H A Marquand, Berkeley Cal, daughter of the first marriage; Mrs A F Barber, Alameda, Cal.; Mrs E J Clinton, Portland, Oregon; A B Byrton, Wildomar, Cal.; Fred S Byrton, Hollywood, Cal.; and Mrs Horace McPhee, Santa Anna, Cal. Mr. Byrton came to the United States from Canada in 1850, and has lived in Boston, New York, Sacramento, Alameda, Hollywood, Wildomar, Compton and Santa Anna. Mr. Byrton was a genuine and devoted Christian man, and a member of the Baptist denomination for fifty-three years. In this denomination he held every office and position of trust open to laymen. Deacon for the greater part of his life and Sunday School superintendent for a quarter of a century, he was ever active in good works and abounded in most efficient service. He carried in his face and his voice and his spirit that goodness and grace which are born from above. He was as happy in death as in life, and a voice spoke when he departed; "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord."

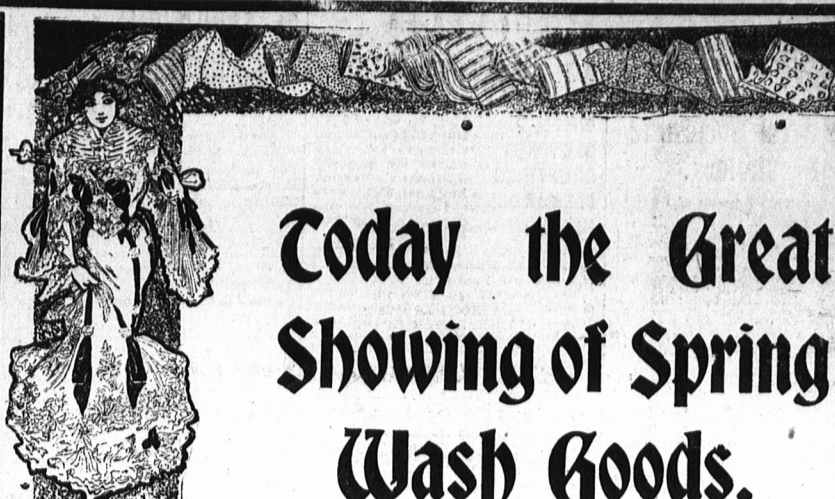
