### Pirates Loot River Steamer

(Special to The Guardian)

SHANGHAI, Nov. 5.—The British river steamer Shasi was pirated off thirty two Chinese steamer, his wife and Japanese crew near Hankow while en route to Shanghai Saturday night. Firing pistols, the captain and locked him, his wife and two children in their cabin. They then overpowered five other foreigners, including Mr. and Mrs. Nathaniel Pepper of New York; Pepper is a journalist.

Henry Hennis, American import manager of the Gale Co., Hankow, was wounded and departed in a launch which drew up alongside. The Shasi returned to Hankow and Hennis was removed to a hospital, where he was treated for a wound in the thigh. This is the first case of piracy on the Yangtze river since Blas Bay was cleaned out.
