Truckmen's Asso. Hold Meeting In Montague On Thursday night the Truckmen's Association held a rally at Montague with the president, Mr. Russell MacIntyre, presiding. The secretary, L. R. Stanley, read the minutes of the last meeting which were approved as read. The treasurer, Edward Brown, presented the financial report of the Association. The president, Mr. MacIntyre, said in part that present trucking rates were low in comparison with the prevailing cost of living. He went on to cite the high cost of trucks, the heavy expenditure for replacements, and the high expense of operation. All which must be paid from rates which had increased but slightly during the past ten years. He appealed to the Association members for unified strength in their attempt to solve

their problems, and hoped that all truckmen would join the Association this year. He showed further that with only 60 per cent of the truckmen in the Association, that their requests for higher trucking rates would go unanswered, and that only with 100 per cent membership would present conditions change. He further urged the formation of sub-committees in each grievance of each unit to the central executive, and that these sub-committees should try to enlist as many members as possible in the Association. Following a considerable amount of discussion it was moved by Gerald McCarron, seconded by John MacKenzie, that a resolution should be presented to the Legislature of the coming session dealing with a fair scale of trucking rates to cope with the rising cost of living and equipment. Mr. Stanley presented the problem of truck registration which was presenting some difficulty. Many members felt that the registration should be governed by gross weight, which they felt would lead to better proportional returns. Others wished for the registration of trucks classified as one, two, two and a half, and three tons, with detailed trucking capacity load, which would lead to the removal of excess loading. Mr. Brown urged the formation of sub-committees so that the dues in each county might be collected by local representatives. He felt that these committees would also be of great benefit in increasing the membership, and lend to the members a real interest in the work being
