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Impressive Services At Mt. Stewart United Church

A very large congregation attended the opening of St. John's United Church, Mount Stewart, at both morning and evening services. On Sunday, Nov. 29th, the morning service opened with the singing of "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow."

The pastor, Rev. W. T. Mercer, led in prayer, followed by Hymn No. 164, "The Church's One Foundation." Responsive reading taken from Psalm selection No. 68 was followed by Scripture reading from St. Matthew's Gospel, 16: 13-20 inclusive.

Rev. Wm. Fraser Munro led in prayer. Following the announcements, the pastor extended a welcome to the many visitors and introduced the Rev. William Fraser Munro, M.A., B.D., Sackville, N.B., who is one of the outstanding ministers of the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada.

In the course of an inspiring sermon on his text from the great theme of Paul, "If speak concerning Christ and His Church," he expressed his belief in reaffirming faith in the church not only as it is but as it is to be.

On Sunday evening the church was filled to capacity at the special service of the dedication of the electronic recorded chimes which were placed in the church as a memorial for those who served and gave their lives for the great cause of freedom. The chimes are the first of their kind to be installed in a church on Prince Edward Island.

Besides a cordial welcome extended by the Pastor, to Rev. Mr. Munro, who spoke at the morning service, Mr. Mercer also introduced Brig. W. W. Reid, introduced Brig. W. W. Reid, who welcomed again the Rev. D. Wallace MacPherson, of St. Peter's Bay.

Hymn No. 515 was sung by the congregation. Mr. Mercer referred to a program of a memorial service held in this church, September 28th, 1941 for Sgt. John A. MacEachern, R. C. A. F. pilot, the only member of the church who gave his life in the last great war.

Mr. Mercer then spoke in prayer dedicating the chimes as follows: "In the faith of Jesus Christ we dedicate these chimes to the Glory of God and in memory of the fallen and in thankfulness for those who returned from the conflict, in the name of the Father, God, and the Son and of the Holy Ghost. Amen. The Doxology was then sung and all remained standing with bowed heads for one minute of silence.

Brig. W. W. Reid then spoke expressing his gratitude and felt a distinct honor to be invited to speak to this congregation on such a memorable occasion. Brig. Reid pointed out that all worshippers had one idea in mind, namely, to be with God and go into battle with the feeling that we are going to do our best for the cause of God. In closing he spoke of the excellent, cozy, little church which had recently been improved for the worshipping of the Gothic windows by Mr. Daniel MacAskill and their installation by Mr. Francis Affleck, also the fine painting job by Mr. Harry MacEwen and son of Bristol.

Mr. MacPherson extended congratulations on the improvement of the church and congratulated the congregation on the new chimes. Hymn No. 516, "Lest We Forget" was sung.

Rev. W. F. Munro addressing the congregation spoke of the beautiful simplicity of the dedication of the chimes and of Brig. Reid's address of deep sincerity and of the memorable thought of the chimes.

He spoke of four spiritual bells which must sound out in perfect time and be distinctly heard in harmony. The first bell, that of faith, found in the New Testament, means outlook; one cannot always look out, but can see up. Looking up in faith, faith also means looking forward. We should glance backward and thank God for all He has done for us, but the main point is to look forward. Looking forward not only to pave the way to better spiritual and moral living for our young boys and girls of today, but the establishing of a Christianity in ourselves that will reach to the less fortunate in the distant lands.

The second bell "Prayer." He spoke of not being able to achieve success without prayer, and urged the need of more prayer in churches on the part of ourselves. The third bell "Sacrifice." The great cause of the Kingdom of God calls for sacrificial living and giving; no christian sacrifice is ever in vain. Pagans waste their pains because their plan runs contrary to God's great principles. The fourth bell "Active Effort." Loyalty to Christ and the cause of the church for which it exists. A cool christian is lost. Jesus said: "He that is near me is near the fire" if we want to keep warm keep near Jesus Christ. When God answered and said: "Lord, I have never—". Dr. Myers once said: "he was born without a sense of humor, but by patient praying acquired it. Could we not put a little active effort into our everyday living, and thus walk closer with God. The work is too great for any christian to retire and give up the service of the church.

Let the bells ring out in harmony, faith, prayer, sacrifice and consecrated effort. "Ring out the old, ring in the new. Ring out the false, ring in the true. Ring in the Christ that is to be."

Rev. Munro led in prayer. Hymn No. 455 "Star of Peace" and the benediction brought the service to a close.

Church History

The following history has been compiled by Rev. Mr. Mercer. The history of St. John's United Church at Mt. Stewart is connected with the work of the first Presbyterian Minister to be settled on P. E. I.

In 1806 Rev. Peter Gordon was settled at Covehead and a congregation extending from Covehead to Bay Fortune. Rev. Gordon died in 1809, and was buried in a cemetery at St. Peter's Harbour where the first church stood.

Rev. Pidgeon was the next minister and he was followed by Rev. Robert Douglas, whose daughter was married to Rev. Alexander Falconer and became the mother of Sir Robert Falconer and Rev. James Falconer, D.D., Dr. Falconer, a greatly beloved and retired professor of Pine Hill Divinity College, is still living at Halifax, Nova Scotia.

The references above are to the men who ministered to people over a large area. As time passed changes were made and the large charge from Covehead to Bay Fortune was divided. Rev. Henry Crawford became minister of Mt. Stewart, and East

and West St. Peter's about the year 1838, and was succeeded in 1859 by Rev. D. W. Cameron who was the first minister settled at Mt. Stewart and West St. Peter's. The church which was at West St. Peter's where the cemetery now is, was closed on August 9th, 1898.

Rev. A. Craze conducted the last service in that church. During those years there was much ship-building at Mt. Stewart, and before the church was built services were held in the cook house owned by Kimble Coffin. This cook house was on the other side of the Hillsboro river somewhere between what is now Crane's mill and the river.

The church in which we are now assembled was built in 1854, and is only half its present size. It was later enlarged by cutting it in half and moving both ends apart. Before the church was enlarged the Manse stood behind it, facing the river. At the time of the extension the Manse was moved toward the Forester's Hall, and in 1897 moved to its present position.

inside and out. The window above the choir loft is the Memorial in connection with the war 1914-18. Now there has been installed electronic chimes as a memorial in connection with the war 1939-45.

As far as I know the ministers connected with the Mt. Stewart church since its erection were: Rev. Henry Crawford, Rev. D. W. Cameron, Rev. W. R. Frame, Rev. A. B. MacLeod, Rev. Alex. Craze, Rev. Dr. MacPhail, Rev. R. P. Murray, Rev. J. C. Martin, and Rev. B. H. Penwarden.

The church became united with the Methodist in 1925 and the ministers since then have been: Rev. M. K. Charman, Rev. S. J. Boyce, and Rev. Wm. T. Mercer.
