OF LOCAL INTEREST - In the list of appointments and promotions with the Pacific Command, issued Wednesday by the National Defence Department, appears the following: Lt.-Col. D. E. Martyn, D.S.O., V.D., now on Pacific command staff to be appointed to command Prince Rupert defences with the rank of Colonel. It is interesting to note that Colonel Martyn is brother of Mrs. T. W. L. Prowse of this city.

HEAVY MAIL - Though the mail was not delayed last evening, there was an hour's delay in distributing the mail at the Post Office. Post Office officials explained that some of the noon mail had been missed by an earlier train and as a result it increased the load arriving in the city in the evening. This entailed a great deal of extra work which caused the delay in completing the sorting of the mail.

STARCH FACTORIES TO OPEN - Four Prince Edward Island starch factories will be in operation again this autumn. The first to be opened will be the one at Sackville, owned by Lt.-Col. G. E. Full. They will open the last week in September. There are located at Hunter River, Murray Harbor, St. Peter's and Sackville. For the past few months farmers have hauled thousands of bushels of potatoes to these four plants during digging time. The tubers go into the factories to be processed and then are shipped as starch to the Canadian market of textiles and glues. Last season 225,000 bushels of potatoes were handled in these four factories.

SPECIAL SERVICE - A service of intercession with a celebration of the Holy Communion was held in St. Mary's (Anglican) church on Thursday to mark the British Empire's entrance into the war, and to offer prayers for the armed forces and prayers of intercession for those who have paid the supreme sacrifice. This service was held in accordance with the request by the Anglican Bishops that services be held on Thursdays. The services on Sunday will be in keeping with the special service of prayer on that day as requested by the Government. Rev. Archdeacon G. R. Harrison, rector, was the celebrant at the Holy Communion.

UNION ROAD FARMER INJURED - A Union Road farmer, Mr. C. Hardy is in the Prince Edward Island Hospital with serious injuries following an accident at his farm yesterday. He was picking apples when a limb on which he was standing broke. He fell heavily and injured his hip. He was unable to move and remained there for almost an hour before his neighbors of the household found him. The injured man was brought to the hospital by Cutcliffe's ambulance shortly after 3 o'clock. The full extent of his injuries is unknown. X-ray examination was being made.

POTATO CONDITION IMPROVES - Weather conditions during the past two weeks have tended to dry up the potato blight which hit the crops in this province recently. Mr. S. P. Peppin in charge of the Seed Potato Inspection service here, said last night. However, he warned, the condition can return again if wet weather sets in. Mr. Peppin did not anticipate that the blight in the fields which had been hit by the blight as he believes that the weatherman took a hand in eliminating the blight spores. "The yield appears to be good," he declared but added that it was hard to get a true picture of this because only a few potatoes were dug to examine the prospects. The general is expected to be underway in about two weeks at the outside, he stated.

Air Raid alert Practice held A successful Air Raid alert practice was held throughout the province last night. The test came as a surprise to A.R.P. workers but to their posts when the yellow signal was sent out. It emanated from the Provincial Air Raid Committee and was finished across the city and province at 6:30 and the "all clear" was not given until half an hour later.

Install Four More Sirens Four more Air Raid signal sirens have been installed in the city which boosts the total to five, a 5-horsepower siren having been installed on the City Building some time ago. The additions are one-horsepower sirens and are placed at four corners of the city. The sirens, which have been delayed, are not here yet but another device was installed which enables the five sirens to be set off at once. Later a number of half-horsepower warning sirens will also be distributed in various parts of the city. However, it is felt by A.R.P. officials that the five now installed are adequate in dealing with any emergency.
