W. E. STAVERT TO STRAIGHTEN MEXICAN BANK FAILURE

TORONTO, April 7.—The losses sustained by the Bank of Montreal in Mexico will be large, although as stated previously, the claim of \$7,000,000 (Mexican) presented by the bank represents the liabilities of the United States Banking Company to seven-eighths of its creditors. The Bank of Montreal has become the representative of all the larger creditors in order to sustain its claim to the right to liquidate the insolvent corporation. In addition the bank itself is a creditor for a very large amount, estimated as high as a million dollars.

Local bankers refuse to discuss the situation, but it is said that the manager of the Bank of Montreal in Mexico bought a draft on New York from George T. Ham, the manager of the United States Banking Company, on the assurance that the banking company had a sufficient balance at that centre to take up the draft. There were no funds to meet the draft, and the United States Banking Company collapsed.

W. E. Stavert, formerly of Summerside, who is now in Mexico endeavoring to straighten out the middle, has been prominent in many banking difficulties in Canada during the past few years. He is the man chosen by the president of the Canadian Bankers' Association to investigate the misdoings of the members of the association. He took charge of the affairs of the Bank of Yarmouth, the Ontario Bank and the Sovereign Bank as each of these institutions fell by the wayside. In banking circles he is known as a sort of financial Florence Nightingale, and although he has lost many of his battles, it has been because the death rattle had sounded before he was called in. When the Yarmouth Bank failed on March 6, 1906, the railway leading to the town was buried in snow and Mr. Stavert made a sensational trip across the Bay of Fundy in a tug which was covered with ice when it arrived in the harbor at Yarmouth, greatly to the surprise of the bank officials, who did not expect the curator until the blizzard which enveloped the province had passed.

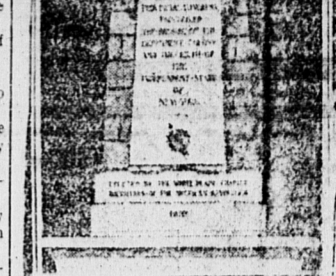
