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

**NOTES ON THE CHARLOTTE TOWN EGG LAYING CONTEST.**  
The Charlottetown Egg Laying Contest did very little better than hold its own during the 12th week, ending January 23, 1921. The number of eggs laid was 345 or a gain of 2 over the preceding week. Two pens of Barred Rocks, Nos. 23 and 25, owned by the Charlottetown Experimental Station, were in the first and second places, 26 and 24 eggs respectively. A pen of White Leghorns owned by James J. Jenkins, of Orwell Cove, and the pen of Barred Rocks, No. 22, owned by the Experimental Station, tied for 3rd place, with 23 eggs each. The pen of White Leghorns, No. 21, owned by the Experimental Station, was 4th with 22 eggs; The pen of Barred Rocks owned by Mrs. R. G. McLaren, of New Perth, was 5th, with 21 eggs; the pen of Barred Rocks owned by Mr. H. L. Machon of Murray Harbour, was 6th with 18 eggs; while the pen of Barred Rocks owned by James Cain of New Perth, and the pen of White Leghorns owned by H. S. Moase of Kensington, were 7th, with 17 eggs each. One hen laid 7 eggs, 6 hens laid 6 eggs, 17 hens laid 5 eggs, and 22 hens laid 4 eggs during the week. There are 105 hens laying, as against 80 the previous week. The Experimental Farm pen No. 25 leads the contest, with 22 eggs; Mr. H. L. Machon's pen of Barred Rocks is 2nd with 174 eggs; the pen of White Leghorns owned by William Neale of Bear River, is 3rd; with 158 eggs; the pen of White Leghorns, No. 21, owned by the Experimental Station is 4th with 155 eggs; the pen of White Leghorns owned by Edwin Reid of Rollo Bay, is 5th; with 142 eggs; Mrs. R. G. McLaren's pen of Barred Rocks is 6th, with 141 eggs; and James J. Jenkins' pen of White Leghorns is 7th, with 139 eggs. The total number of eggs to date is 2266.

The Charlottetown Egg Laying Contest made a fair gain during the 13th week; the total number of eggs being 374, or a gain of 29 over the preceding week. The pen of Barred Rocks No. 25 owned by the Experimental Station was first, with 31 eggs; the pen of Barred Rocks owned by Mr. J. B. Millman of Kensington tied with the pen of Barred Rocks No. 23 owned by the Experimental Station for 2nd place, with 26 eggs each; the pen of White Leghorns No. 21, owned by the Experimental Station was 3rd, with 24 eggs; the pen of White Leghorns owned by Mrs. J. J. McLellan of Grand River was 4th, with 23 eggs; the pen of Barred Rocks of Mrs. R. G. McLaren of New Perth was 5th, with 22 eggs; and the pen of White Leghorns of Mr. James J. Jenkins of Orwell Cove, was 6th; with 21 eggs. Owing to the cold weather, there were no possible laid during the week by any hen, but 4 hens laid 6 eggs, 15 hens laid 5 eggs, and 33 hens laid 4 eggs each during the week. There are 107 hens laying, as against 105 the previous week. The Experimental Farm's pen of Barred Rocks No. 25, still continues to lead the contest, with 252 eggs; the pen of Barred Rocks of Mr. H. L. Machon of Murray Harbour is 2nd, with 159 eggs; the pen of White Leghorns, No. 21 owned by the Experimental Station, is 3rd; with 179 eggs; the pen of White Leg-

### Felsch Surrendered

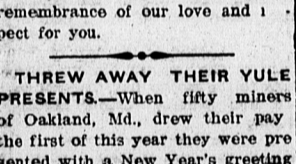
Indicated Ball Player Released on Bonds of \$10,000

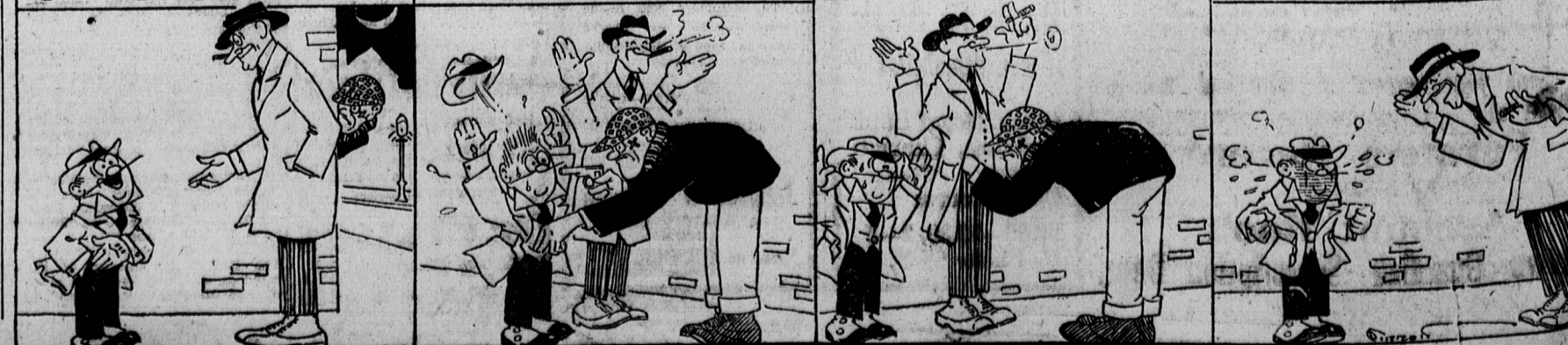
