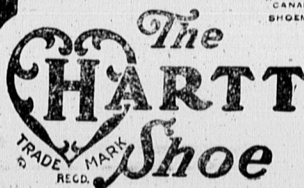

COMPLAIN OF FREIGHT RATES.

MONTREAL, April 20—Strong complaints were made today at meetings of the board of Trade and the Chambre de Commerce as to freight rates between Montreal and St. John and Halifax and other maritime province points.

It was stated at the meeting that owing to a recent agreement between the Intercolonial and the Quebec Steamship Company, freight rates had been put up from 25 to 75 per cent. In fact it was stated that under the new rates, which went into effect a fortnight ago, freight could be shipped to maritime province points more cheaply from Great Britain than from Montreal.

It was also complained that the sudden increase in rates would mean considerable loss to merchants, as they had sold goods to consignees in the maritime provinces on the basis of last year's rates, while the increased rates meant a considerable cut in their profits. The whole question will be sent to the board of railway commissioners and the minister of railways for discussion.

ing about local strikes in various cities, thus securing occasional advantages which they would be unable to obtain through concerted action. They also say that the time has come when employers must stand together to hold their position against their employees. The General Em-ployees' Organization, which includes representatives of every German industry, is firmly supporting the lock-out and already has voted several million marks for the aid of the master builders. The organization apparently proposes to supply the sinews of war so long as the lock-out continues.

The labor unions, too, have been making preparations for the lock-out and planned to support their idle members. The general members of the Socialist organizations, which comprise by far the larger part of the organized builders, have decided to attempt no assistance for the first two weeks. Owing to the huge proportions of the lock-out it will be an extremely difficult problem for the labor unions to secure sufficient contributions to maintain their members and their families through a prolonged period of idleness.

DARTMOUTH MINISTER ACCEPTS GUELPH CALL

HALIFAX, N. S., April 20 Rev. Dr. D. S. Dix, minister of the Presbyterian church in Dartmouth, at a meeting tonight informed his congregation that he had decided to accept the call to Chalmers church, Guelph. Dr. Dix is an Ontario man and has been pastor about two years. The reasons given were his health and the larger field in Guelph.

WANTS COMPULSORY EDUCATION ACT ENFORCED IN MONCTON

MONCTON, N. B., April 20—The school board tonight passed a resolution expressing the opinion that the compulsory education act should be brought into force in Moncton at once, and directing the city council's attention to the matter.

Chief Rideout submitted a report to the school board, giving the names of fifty children of school age, found running the streets and not attending school. This was used as an argument in favor of compulsory education, and the necessity for a new school building in the West End of the city. It was stated that plans for the new building are being prepared by F. Neil Brodie, of St. John and would be ready in ten days.

REMEMBER FATE OF THE BUFFALO.

TORONTO, April 20—Beaver lake become so numerous in the Algonquin National park and are causing such annoyance by persistently damming streams, which are not wanted to be dammed, that the Ontario government has decided to sacrifice five thousand of them. They will be trapped by park rangers and the skins sold to the highest bidder. The skins are worth from ten to fifteen dollars each. Seventeen years ago when the park was reserved the beaver were almost extinct there. Now they are so plentiful that the superintendent says five hundred can be taken from a very small section without being missed.
