The latest news, first of all.

D. W. McDonald, Vernon, was in the city yesterday.

Neil McQuarrie, Summerside, returned yesterday afternoon after a business trip to this city.

Rev. G. R. Sinclair and Mrs. Sinclair, Tyne Valley, crossed by the Northumberland to the mainland yesterday.

Miss Rosetta Gorman and niece of this city left for Gloucester, Mass yesterday morning accompanied by her brother to Summerside.

Ollie McLeod, the popular station agent at Montague, who has not been well for some time past and who has made application for pension under the government railwaymen's pension regulations was a passenger to Summerside yesterday to meet the Secretary of the Board and to undergo the customary examinations.

Quebec counts on twenty-five thousand Knights of Columbus being present at the National Convention which meets there on the second of August. Several members of Charlottetown Council are leaving here on Monday to be present. This being the first meeting of the National Council on Canadian soil, it is more than of ordinary interest to Canadians.

The Bishop of Nova Scotia held an ordination at St. Stephen's, Halifax, on Sunday, July 17th, when Charles Haselden Talmay, of Burgh and Durham, England, was ordained deacon. The candidate was presented by Rev. K. C. Hind, the Bishop's chaplain, and Rev. V. E. Harris preached a helpful sermon on "The Miracle of the Five Thousand" as illustrating the work of the ministry—Church Work. Mr. Talmay will be stationed at Alberton, P. E. I. and is now in his parish having arrived in this city some days ago and proceeded later to take up work in his new charge.

Previous to the departure of the Principal, Miss Alice Murchison, from Tryon, the young ladies of the Consolidated School waited on her at her boarding house, Mrs. Knight's and presented her with an address and lovely bouquet of roses, also a handsome box of stationery. Miss Murchison, completely taken by surprise, thanked them in suitable words for their kindness. They then treated one and all to a generous supply of their own make of ice cream, social evening was spent in singing, etc. Such kindness from scholars brighten the teachers' vocation.

G. Lelacheur, ex-Principal of the MacDonald Consolidated School, is undertaking the preliminary survey of a hundred farms in relation to the Public Lands Committee of the Commission on Conservation. His farm experience, supplemented by the two years course at Guelph and two years with Professors Zavitz and Klinek, of Crops and Soil fame, should give him the necessary qualifications for his work. The Public Lands Committee, of which Dr. Jas. W. Robertson is chairman, seeks information regarding rotation of crops and the prevalence of weeds, insect pests, and plant diseases. The water supply in relation to the public health and the sources of heat, power and light on the farm, will also be inquired into. The scope and object of this work will be discussed at Hillsboro on August 9th, and at Summerside on August 10th, where meetings for the people will be addressed by Dr. Jas. W. Robertson and members of the Commission. Meantime we bespeak for Mr. Lelacheur the courtesy of all farmers visited. He is now at work in Lot 23.

A very pretty marriage was solemnized in St. Dunstan's Cathedral at 7.30 yesterday morning when Miss Tena Gaudet of this city became the bride of James Coyle, foreman of the Patriot mechanical department and one of the most popular members of the Alberton Athletic Association. Rev. G. J. McLellan performed the ceremony. The bride, was tastefully dressed in cream serge with large black hat and carried a beautiful bridal bouquet of white roses and maiden-hair fern. The bridesmaid was Miss Margaret Coyle, sister of the groom, who wore pale blue and a black hat and also carried a large bouquet. The groom was supported by the bride's brother, Cornelius Gaudet. A large number of friends were present at the ceremony. "Jimmy" who has rendered splendid service for a number of years on the football field for the Abegweits was remembered by the members of that Association by the gift of a splendid Morris chair. Speaking to The Guardian last evening Mr. Wakeford of the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company, stated that he had no knowledge of any proposal of this nature having been submitted to his Company and says there is no truth in any of the rumors.
