A SHOP-KEEPER'S COMPLAINT.

SIR,—As a business man may I ask the favor of a small space in The Guardian to call attention to a practice that in recent years has become very prevalent in Charlottetown and which if not already such threatens to become an intolerable nuisance to business men. I refer to the begging depredations that appear to be ever on the wing and who seem to regard the shop-keepers both large and small as their legitimate prey. If a hall is to be built in any section of the country, repairs made to a church building, if a house or bar of some unfortunate is burnt, (who is too niggardly to protect himself by insurance), an appeal to the merchants is at once the readiest way to provide funds. Bazaars, tea parties, concerts, pie socials, horse races, rummage sales, shooting matches, all must be liberally contributed to by the shop-keeper. Again there is the same feature in the form of advertising on concert programs and in publications of no use to any one except the publisher who finds it an easy way of extorting money from the long suffering merchant. I term it blackmailing, it is nothing less in my opinion, for if the merchant refuses to "help" he is aware that to a more or less extent his store will be boycotted. 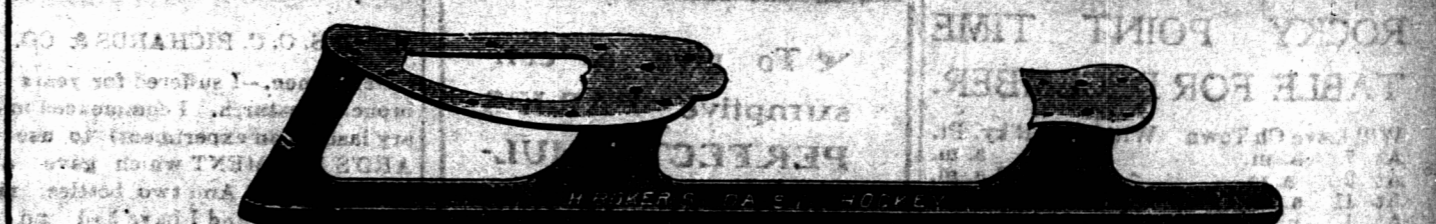
