BENNY BINNS RETAINS TITLE WITH K.O.

Island Welterweight Secures Victory Over McNeill in 4th Round—Large Crowd Attended Bout.

(Special to The Guardian) Before a capacity house at the Summerside Hockey rink last night Benny Binns of Charlottetown scored a four-round K. O. over Davis McNeill of Pictou to retain his Island welterweight championship. The bout was a hard punching affair from bell to bell. In the first stanza Binns threw wild swinging punches as which McNeill ducked and countered heavily in the close in fighting, having much the better of the rough house fighting. The fight continued its furious pace throughout the second until the last few seconds when McNeill went down claiming a foul. However, the referee started a count over him and he came up at the count of two. McNeill opened the third and beat Benny's crablike stance with solid rights and lefts. But in one of the toe to toe slugging matches Binns opened a cut over McNeill's left eye slowing him up. Swinging a vicious right to McNeill's jaw Binns floored his opponent but the bell saved him at the count of eight.

Uses 18 Players

In his first sortie, Gorman used 18 players Alex Connell worked in one net while Dave Kerr guarded the other. Forming the defense in front of Connell were "Cy" Westworth and "Stew" Evans. Holey Smith, flanked by "Baldy" Northcott and Jimmie Ward, made up the defense. Alternates were Paul Haynes, Herbie Cain and Gus Mark-

Behind the blue line at the other end of the rink Bill MacKenzie and Allan Shielis, a former Ottawa player, protected Kerr. Russell Bilanco, ex-Windsor, took center with Earl Robinson and Dave Trotter respectively right and left wingers, formed the firing line.

"Dutch" Gainer and the Maritimes Sammy McManus and Aubrey Webster, composed the second string. Gainer, staging a comeback after a sojourn of one season in the minors, with Calgary, was most impressive. With McManus and Webster, Gorman's stars in the Moncton Hawks, Dominion amateur champions lineup last year, Gainer executed several brilliant passing movements.

EASTMAN IN LINE FOR MAJOR AWARD

"Blazing Ben" And William Lawson Little Mentioned For Memorial Medal.

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—The most highly prized of all amateur athletic awards in the United States, the James E. Sullivan Memorial Medal for outstanding achievement and character, is likely to go to the far west this year, with Benjamin Bangs Eastman and William Lawson Little, Jr., ranking well on top of the field of candidates so far put forward in nation-wide roll. Competition for the medal, which is awarded annually by the Amateur Athletic Union on a voting basis, has been re-opened to include representatives in all United States amateur sports for 1934. Last year, when Glenn Cunningham nosed out his mile-running rival, Bill Bonhron, by a single vote, candidates were limited to the branches of athletics controlled by the A. A. U.

Rumors That "Big Four" Will Turn Professional Taken Lightly By Clubs

By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Oct. 23.—Rumors that of securing transfers for these play- clubs in the Maritime Hockey League might turn professional for the 1934-35 season were published by the Halifax Mail today. Words to this effect have been floating from mouth to mouth among local sportsmen for the past week or 10 days, it was stated, and "graybeards of local sportsmen openly predict a major break in the situation that exists at the present time." Difficulty of securing the transfers of importers upon whom the league depends for most of its players, from the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and branches, was given as one of the outstanding reasons for the possibility of a change. Not one of the newcomers to the lineups of Charlottetown, Halifax and Saint John teams have yet received cards permitting them to play with the respective clubs. MODERNIZATION OF JAPAN REFLECTED IN PAPER IMPORTS

Canada is credited with 99.1 per cent of the total newspaper imports into Japan for the first six months of 1934, a slight increase over the same period last year, also 80 per cent of the total of all paper imports. Newspaper accounts for 62.4 per cent of the total imports of paper of all types, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Changes going on in the modernization of Japan is reflected in the increase in foreign purchases of packing paper, indicating the greater purchases in departmental and other stores. The growth of restaurants, cafes and present day amusement centres have brought about larger imports of wallpaper.
