Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole heir of a family or any male over eighteen years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Dues—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his cultivated land. A habitable house is required in each of three years. Cultivate 50 acres and erect house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. GOING ON WITH THE HUDSON BAY LINE.

WINNIPEG, April, 26.—The Hudson Bay Railway will not be completed until the summer of 1920, announced Premier Norris, of Manitoba, on his return from a conference on the subject with the Government at Ottawa, it being a Canadian Government enterprise. Work will, however, go on all summer, and as steel is only 98 miles from the terminus, good progress will undoubtedly be made; the grading is completed. The completion of great docks, which stretch out a long distance from the shallow parts of Fort Nelson harbor, will be in the programme, and a good start made on the erection of immense grain elevators. The delay is due to the extensive building programme to be launched by the Government on the Canadian National Railway system this year.
