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Lone Woman In Canada's Parliament

(By C. R. BLACKBURN) (Canadian Press Staff Writer) OTTAWA, April 9.—(CP)—Mrs. Dorice W. Neilson, 38-year-old pioneer wife and mother, subject of Canada's latest success story will be the lone representative of her sex in the House of Commons when Parliament meets next month.

English born and well-educated, the new woman member-elect came to Canada as Dorice Webber in 1902 and later moved to her present Saskatchewan hamlet of Norbury. She married Peter O. Neilson in 1927 and cast in her lot with the scattered farmers of the north coast.

Out of that obscurity and after 13 years during which depression and hardship were her constant companions Mrs. Neilson was elected to wrest North Battleford seat in the House of Commons from the seasoned Liberal, Cameron W. McInnis, in last month's Dominion Election, after a hotly contested race presented the riding since 1925.

As a representative of the newly-formed unity party Mrs. Neilson has little money to aid her campaign. She was unable to visit the far northern districts of the riding open only to air travel which she could not afford.

Her election marked another step in the slow progress of feminine participation in Parliament since 1921 when Miss Agnes MacLean was the first to be elected to the House of Commons and Miss Irene Paribyl was elected to the Alberta Legislature.

In the Dominion Election there were nine women candidates but Mrs. Neilson, a newcomer to politics, was the only one successful. Macphail defeated in Grey-Bruce, Johnson in previous five consecutive general elections.

Mrs. Martha Louise Black, second woman in the House of Commons, was elected in the Yukon in 1935 when her husband, George Black, retired temporarily because of ill-health. But Mrs. Black retired in favour of her husband in the campaign and saw him elected.

In the provincial field, however, women have had greater success and there are three women members in the British Columbia Legislature, and one each in Manitoba and Alberta.

THE CONTROL OF PLUM POCKETS AND PEACH LEAF CURR.

While plums and peaches are not produced in large volume in the Maritime Provinces, nevertheless there are sufficient trees of these fruits to warrant the own-growers paying attention to the production of a crop for the local market. Each year the Laboratory of Plant Pathology, Science Department, N.S. states J. F. Hickey, officer-in-charge, receives specimens of plum pockets, as well as peach leaf curr, with requests for control directions.

Plum pockets is caused by a fungus which stimulates the young fruits to become enlarged and hollow. The name bladder plums has also been given to these false fruits. Some seasons a large part of the crop may be lost on account of
