**COAL SCHOONERS.**—The schooners Mayflower, Daisy and Arizona are discharging Acadia round coal for Geo. E. Full, Charlottetown. 573.

**SUNDAY SCHOOL PICNIC.**—The Bonshaw Presbyterian Church picnic which was held last Monday was a great success.

**SCHOONER SAILS.**—The large three-masted schooner Edward Blake sails from New York today with eight hundred tons of the best American hard coal for Geo. E. Full, Charlottetown. 574.

**VERNON RIVER.**—Rev. Prof. W. G. Watson, B.D., spent Sunday, July 28, at Vernon River and Cherry Valley, much to the pleasure and profit of the people. The masterly address on the great educational work of the Methodists and especially their own work at Mt. Allison was presented in a pleasing and attractive manner. The interest in educational work has been considerably augmented which will bear fruit in the future, as well as the present. The ladies of the W. M. Aux. have presented the Vernon River Church with a new pulpit Bible and Hymn Book.

**POLICE COURT CASES.**—At the City Magistrate's Court yesterday morning, before Stipendiary Martin, three cases of drunkenness were dealt with. For being drunk and disorderly on Saturday, John Hughes, who was prosecuted by Officer Taylor and admitted his guilt, was fined \$10, with the option of a month's imprisonment; and not paying the fine was committed to prison. For having been drunk on the same day, Daniel McNeill, who was prosecuted by Officer McInnis, was fined \$5 or 20 days' imprisonment; in his case the fine was paid. Similarly charged, by Officer McInnis, also, Henry Welsh was ordered to pay \$10, or undergo imprisonment for a month, and not paying the fine, he was committed.

**REMEMBERED.**—Rev. Edwin Smith's ministry in Chipman ended on July 20. On the eve of his departure, his congregation gave him a surprise party on the Mansie lawn. A large number attended in spite of the threatening weather, and when the rain came in copious showers all adjourned to the church nearby, where after refreshments had been served and a pleasant evening had been spent generally, Isaac C. Fraser, on behalf of the congregation, presented Mr. and Mrs. Smith with a purse of \$100 in token of the goodwill and esteem of the people among whom he labored. Mr. Smith in a few fitting words thanked them for their good will and for the tangible expression of the same. He with his family will shortly leave for the Canadian west, where he has accepted a call to MacLeod (Alta.).—Mr. Smith was formerly of Cardigan, P. E. I.

**PROHIBITION PROSECUTIONS.**—Yesterday morning, at the City Magistrate's Court, His Honor K. J. Martin, City Stipendiary, gave judgment in the case of Allan Boman, Prohibition Inspector, against John McKenna, of Richmond street, vendor under the Prohibition Act. The charge against the defendant was that between the 11th June and the 9th July, he, being a vendor, did sell liquor to a person not holding a medical certificate. For the defence Mr. Stewart, K. C., appeared. The evidence upon which the defendant was convicted was that during his absence his clerk sold a bottle of whiskey to a man whose wife holds a medical certificate, but who admitted in evidence that the liquor was not obtained for his wife's use but for his own. His Honor held that a technical offence had been committed against the Act, that though the defendant morally was not guilty, he was convicted, and he consequently imposed upon him the fine prescribed by the law, \$100, with the option of three months imprisonment. A similar charge against Pieton C. Brown, of Kent street, was dismissed.

**A SEIZURE.**—A case is to engage the attention of Stipendiary Shaw of Queen's County this week as the outcome of a seizure of beer which was made in this county outside the city limits recently. A number of bottles containing the liquor were seized, and their contents have been submitted to analysis, and it is understood that the result of this has shown the stuff to be of a strength well over three per cent.

**PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.**—The weather during the past week (writing July 15th) has been very favorable for the growth of all kinds of crops, says a correspondent to the Farmers Advocate. The hay has thickened up very much and the present prospect is that there will be about 75 per cent. of an average crop. Hay making will begin about the 25th or ten days later than usual. All other crops with the exception of corn are much above the average. Farmers are now getting the odds and ends done up before the hoeing of the root crops begins. Since the middle of June the officials of the Department of Agriculture have been very busy in the country. Live-stock judging classes have been held, and at several places they have been in connection with Farmers' Picnics, which have proved not only popular, but also very instructive. Wherever the picnic was held the attendance was large and a greater interest was taken in the judging classes. The Women's Institute movement, too, is spreading rapidly under the fostering care of Miss Katherine James, an graduate of Macdonald Institute of the U. O. A. C. Several egg circles have been formed and are meeting with the usual opposition from interested parties who do not care to see farmers being organized. This opposition is only opening the eyes of the more intelligent, and the movement will spread with great rapidity.

**THE QUEBEC MARRIAGE LAW.**—MONTREAL, July 28.—A cable says that special leave to an appeal has been granted by the Privy Council in the Tremblay-Depatit marriage case. This is a case which affects the Quebec marriage law.

LONDON, July 25.—The marriage of Prince Arthur of Connaught and the Duchess of Fife will be celebrated on October 15 in the Chapel Royal in St. James Palace. It is understood that Prince Arthur has asked the Prince of Wales to act as best man, and that the latter has consented, while Princess Mary is expected to be one of the bridesmaids. The King, on rare occasions, has given permission for other than Royal weddings to be held in St. James Palace. One of the last weddings there was that of Jean Reid and John Ward.

# SIXTEEN THOUSAND AUTOMOBILE LICENSES.

Just about 16,000 automobile licenses have been issued by the Provincial Secretary's department, Ontario, so far this season. While makers displaying much higher numbers are seen on the streets, it must be remembered that there are seventeen points of issue, and the makers with licenses to correspond are sent out in batches of one thousand.

In addition to this number there are 650 dealers' licenses, characterized by the letter "M" before the number. There are 3,000 licensed chauffeurs, and motor cycles to the number of 2,500 may skirt through the countryside. All this represents an income of about \$85,000 to the provincial exchequer, for motorists, dealers, chauffeurs and cyclists must all pay their


