CAP. XIX.

A By-law to regulate and compel the removal of snow and ice from off the side walks

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:

Removal of snow. 1. Every tenant or occupant of any building or lot of land, and in the case there is no occupant, or tenant, then the owner or the agent of the owner, or any person having the care of any such building or lot of land bordering on any street, lane, square or public wharf within the City of Charlottetown and Common thereof, where there is any footway or sidewalk, shall, after the ceasing to fall of any snow—if in the daytime, four hours after; and if in the night, before ten o'clock of the forenoon succeeding; cause such snow to be removed from such footway or sidewalk, so far as such building or lot of land extends along such street, lane, square or public wharf, under a penalty of two dollars for every neglect, and the further sum of one dollar each day for every day such snow shall not be removed. The provisions of this section shall also apply to the falling of snow from any building.

Ice. 2. Whenever the footway or sidewalk, or any part thereof adjoining any building or lot of land along any street, lane or square, shall be encumbered with ice, it shall be the duty of the tenant or occupant—and in case there is no tenant or occupant—then the owner or person having the care of such building or lot of land to cause such footway or sidewalk to be made safe by removing the ice, or by covering the same with ashes, sand, or other suitable substance. And in case such owner, tenant, occupant or caretaker shall neglect so to do for the space of two hours during the daytime, he shall forfeit and pay the sum of two dollars for every neglect, and a like sum of two dollars for every day such neglect shall be continued.

Penal Clause. 3. Any person or persons guilty of an infraction of any of the provisions of this By-law shall for each and every offence, upon summary conviction thereof before the Stipendiary Magistrate of the City of Charlottetown, forfeit and pay such penalty, together with costs forthwith as is provided in this By-law and in default of payment thereof it shall and may be lawful for the said Magistrate to commit the offenders to the common jail of Queen's County for any period not exceeding ten days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid.

TWO PRESBYTERIAN CHURCHES VOTE ON UNION.

The two leading Presbyterian Churches in Charlottetown, St. James' and Zion, have now about completed their balloting on the great question of the proposed union of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational Churches in Canada. One has given a strong majority in favor of union and the other has voted even more strongly against it. The contrast of the two verdicts is so great, the question upon which they voted so important, and the two churches are so prominent in the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island that some further particulars in regard to them may be of interest.

The following statistics of the two congregations are taken from the Record of the General Assembly of 1911:

The pastors of the two churches are Rev. T. F. Fullerton in St. James and Rev. R. G. Strathie in Zion, the first-named being opposed to the union and the last-named being its ardent advocate. The congregations seem to have followed pretty closely the views of their respective pastors as to the desirability of the proposed union and in their estimate of the

proposed basis, which seems natural enough as comparatively few members in either church could be expected to have given the matter the same exhaustive consideration as their leaders have done.

We regard it as remarkable that two large Presbyterian congregations in the same city and located but a few blocks apart, should have voted with such large majorities on opposite sides of the same question. This along with the recent majorities against the union given by several Presbyterian Churches in St. John would go to indicate that there will be found to be throughout Canada, in the Presbyterian body at least, a volume of opinion against the union that is much too strong to be ignored and which will prevent its consummation in the immediate future.

It is quite beyond question that the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches in Canada have been drawn closer to each other in recent years than they formerly were, without harm to either and probably to the advantage and greater usefulness of both. The friends of organic union will continue no doubt to hope that whatever the immediate result of the vote on the union question may be, they will yet be brought together. It is conceded that a majority in all the three bodies concerned now desire to unite and this fact ought at least to strengthen their mutual good will and regard for each other.

SALARIES OF CITY TEACHERS.

It is notorious that the greatly increased cost of living grips the salaried man or woman, the professional and wage-earning classes pretty hard. The Labor Bureau at Ottawa after diligent inquiry has reached the conclusion that the average cost of 261 commodities in common use is 31 per cent higher than it was ten or twelve years ago and is still advancing. And even in the nineties of last century the common complaint was that teachers' salaries were too low. If the pay was too low then, what must be the case now when it takes \$1.31 to buy what could then be paid for with one dollar? In the meantime the salaries of Senators and Members of Parliament, of the civil service, railway men and others have been increased because of the greatly increased cost of living. The plea of the school teachers for more pay and especially those who live in the city and towns of this Province, is not only strongly supported by theory, argument and fact but also by the examples above cited.

True, if the salaries of teachers are to be advanced, the people whose children are to be educated and the taxpayers in general must pay something additional. But ours is not a poor country. The average of wealth is as high in Prince Edward Island as in any Province of Canada, while the salaries of teachers are higher in almost every other Province than our own. No doubt the cost of living is considerably less here than in the Northwest, for instance, but the salaries there and in other places are so much higher than here that many of


