Notes by the Way

The Maritime Provinces are just now commanding more attention in the Government, in Parliament and before such high official boards as the Railway Commission than has been allotted to them for many years past.

The Ottawa Government has been compelled by the stress of public opinion to consider the situation and has resorted to the expedient of appointing a Commission of Inquiry.

The Maritime case was very strongly presented in the House of Commons by Mr. Black, of Halifax, who moved the resolution, Dr. McLaren of Saint John, who seconded it, by Col. Cantley, of Pictou, and others from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and by Hon. J. A. Macdonald, from King's County, P. E. I., also by Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, Mr. Cahau, of Montreal, Mr. Church of Toronto, and others in able speeches.

Hon. J. A. Macdonald from our own Province expressed regret that the problem of Maritime Rights had been referred to a Commission which implied that no other immediate action would be taken this year.

It was to be expected that Premier King would defend the appointment of the Commission of Inquiry and he did so, dwelling upon the ability and fitness of the men the Government had appointed.

The discussion appears to have been, as far as possible, free from party political bias which was so far highly commendable, and it ended with the unanimous adoption of the resolution in recognition of Maritime Rights, which was better.

Parliament has heard the representatives of the Maritimes and Parliament has spoken. Its voice is in accord with the resolutions adopted by the Legislatures in the Provinces by the sea.

In regard to the Government's plans for satisfying our claims, or providing remedies for our grievances we are left equally in the dark.
