Boston Red Sox last night won their fifth consecutive American League game — a new high for the season — by whipping the second-place Detroit Tigers 6-1. Walter Maveson was the winner, although he had to leave after 6 2/3 innings because of a sore elbow.

In New York, the leading Yankees blasted last-place St. Louis 4-1 with first baseman hitting his first homer of the season with two on in the sixth inning. Fred Sanford, purchased from the Browns for \$100,000, went the distance and limited his former mates to seven hits.

Right-handed Dick Fowler of Toronto recorded his fifth straight with a four-hit shutout as Philadelphia downed Cleveland 4-1 to increase their third-place edge over the world champions to two games.

Chicago snapped a five-game losing streak with a 5-4 victory over Washington.

The Red Sox scored pairs of runs in the third and fifth against starting left-hander Ted Gray, who was charged with the loss, and added another pair against Dizzy Trout, third Bengal pitcher.

The only Tiger run came in the seventh when Johnny Groth doubled to the flag pole, 379 feet from home plate in centre field, and scored on Don Kolloway's single into left.

Philadelphia's Fowler, who now has allowed but three runs in his last 35 innings of pitching, saw time in the opening inning.

Hank Majeski bobbled Joe Gordon's grounder with the bags loaded and one away. Fowler issued three successive passes after he retired the first batter. A double play on Lou Boudreau's grounder followed the miscue.

Shortstop Luke Appling of Chicago was thumbed from the game in Washington for the third time in his lengthy career when he protested a called third strike by umpire Bill Summers in the seventh inning.
