FUTURE OF NEW DEAL UNCERTAIN

Price Cutting Developing Despite Appeal of U. S. Administration.
(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, May 28—Halted in mid-stride by the Supreme Court's abrupt destruction of NRA, the New Deal groped dazedly tonight for a pathway into the future.

Under consideration was a plan for an entirely voluntary structure of codes for the government of business, limited to major wages and man on child labor, with all the old coercive or compulsory provisions eliminated.

Conferences scattered from Congress to the White House hardly got beyond a discussion of the court's opinion, with its emphatic declaration that Congress had illegally delegated its powers to the President and that the federal legislature has no control over intra-state commerce, or its hours or wages.

NORMANDIE ON MAIDEN VOYAGE TODAY

Giant French Liner Is Expected To Establish Record Speed Crossing.
(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LE HAVRE, France, May 28—The giant French liner Normandie, carrying Mme. Albert Lebrun, wife of the President, and a host of celebrities, will cast off tomorrow on her maiden voyage and is due in New York June 3.

Four Day Trip

The Normandie not only seeks to seize the blue ribbon for speed, but her owners want to hold the record against Great Britain's super-liner Queen Mary, now being completed. The Normandie is expected to reach New York in a few hours more than four days.

Europa Holds Record

The present record for the westward crossing is four days, 17 hours, 45 minutes from Cherbourg, breakwater to Ambrose lightship—an average of 27.92 knots for the distance of 3,199 sea miles, established by the North German Lloyd liner Europa. For the eastward crossing, the Bremen of the same line averaged 28.51 knots, covering the distance in four days, 16 hours, 15 minutes.

Pair Held On Murder Charge

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) COORNWALL, Ont., May 28—A young widow and a transient farm hand were held here tonight on a charge of murdering the woman's middle-aged husband last April.

Arrest of the couple, Mrs. Vinny Belle Volvey and Clarence Cameron, both 28, followed presentation of a coroner's jury verdict that Louis Volvey, 55-year-old Stornont County farmer, died after being strangled or throttled.

Stresses Value Of Handicrafts

Premier MacMillan Opens Canadian Handicrafts Guild Exhibition On Liner Athenia, Montreal.
(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, May 28—The Canadian Handicrafts Guild Exhibition, containing a display of home-made articles from all over Canada, was opened on the liner Athenia to the public here today by Hon. W. J. P. MacMillan, M.D., F.A.C.S., Premier of Prince Edward Island. The Premier stressed the value of handicrafts as a means of increasing the pleasure of foreign manufactured goods.

IMPROVEMENT IN EMPLOYMENT

OTTAWA, May 28—An improvement was shown in the employment situation on May 1 in all provinces, while the Maritime Provinces was the only economic area to show a decline in comparison with May 1, 1934, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Reports received from 9,203 firms show 899,584 men at work a gain of 17,487 compared with the preceding month.

The crude index, higher than any year since 1931, stood at 95.7 against 92.0 on May 1, 1934, and 77.6 in 1933.

In the Maritime Provinces 65 firms reported 69,417 employed, a gain of 1,217 over the preceding month. Improvements were noted in manufacturing, logging and mining, and construction, while workers were released in transportation and railway construction.

In Quebec 2,193 employers reported 246,342 persons at work a gain of 10,326 against the previous month. Increase was shown in manufacturing, logging, transportation and highway construction.

Forest Fires Flare Anew Throughout Nova Scotia

HALIFAX, May 28—Five buildings fell prey to flames in Nova Scotia today, two of them destroyed by a forest fire which threatened a section of Liverpool for several hours before it was brought under control.
