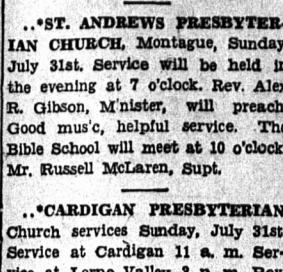

SHARK LOSES EIGHT TEETH

DIGBY, N. S., July 28. (By the Canadian Press)—There were teeth in the keel. If you want to go fishing around Digby Gut you should have a staunch boat, otherwise a shark may bite a piece out of it with consequences too horrible to contemplate. On Digby beach is now drawn up a boat with eight shark's teeth in the keel—count them—eight. Two fishermen were only saved from being bitten in two by the fact that their boat was of a sufficient thickness to tear the teeth from the shark's jaw and send him away discomfited, prodded by boathooks and walloped by oars, minus his molars.

The oldest inhabitant recalls a case 45 years ago when two Indians in a canoe waged battle with a shark and came off with the loss of one life. Louis Picou was the Indian who successfully swam ashore after he had let the shark have both barrels of a shotgun. His companion, exhausted by the struggle, could not reach the beach. In this epic the shark attacked without warning and bit a piece about two feet in diameter from the hull. Picou, standing in the bow, took careful aim and let him have it. The shark, discomfited, went away. Thousands of people came to Digby to see the canoe with the hole in the bottom. They are all dead now but hundreds of their descendants have come to see the eight shark's teeth.

Unemployment Scheme Will Help Thousands

CHICAGO, July 28.—A quarter of a million men working 30 hours a week for 11 months—that will be the result, a nation wide survey indicated today, of the \$120,000,000 federal appropriation to aid states in highway construction. In practically every state, the construction programme, designed to make the jobless self sustaining, was hailed as a vigorous step in the right direction. Relief workers generally were enthusiastic over the provision for a 30-hour week, thus providing jobs for more workers over a longer period.

Highway construction will be doubled or tripled in many states by the federal appropriation, which must be matched dollar for dollar by the states themselves. Governors of several states indicated as many as 40,000 men would be employed at road work.

In addition to the thousands working directly at road construction, others will be employed at manufacturing materials and machinery. Work for the unemployed also was expected to better business conditions in countless communities throughout the nation. Contracting companies everywhere were jubilant over expectations of new jobs. Employees who have been laid off for months were told to "Come back in a week or so and we'll probably have something."

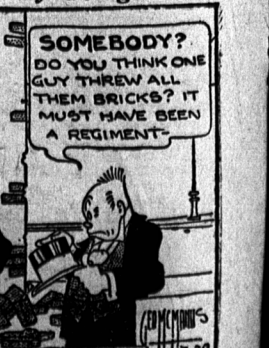
