

P. W. C. DEBATE.—The subject debated by the Prince of Wales Debating Society on Tuesday last was:—"Resolved that Oriental immigrants should not be admitted into Canada." The speakers were—Fr.—D. A. MacPherson, Bessie Rattee, M. Campbell, Lillian MacKenzie; Con.—G. MacPhee, Sadie MacNeill, M. Blake, Hattie MacSwain. The vote stood 35-12 in support of the resolution. The critic, Beatrice Campbell, spoke favourably of the debate.

SPLENDID MEETING.—The Institute at Hope River had the pleasure of listening to a very instructive and interesting address on Entomology, recently, by Mr. M. H. Coughlan, student of Nova Scotia Agricultural College. During an hour and a half the speaker successfully unfolded the mysteries of the insect world to a large and appreciative audience. He quoted from statistics compiled by the United States government, it being the foremost country in the world on the subject of Entomology, showing the annual loss to agriculture by insect pests, also giving a vivid account of the many ways by which insects carry, spread and cause disease of many kinds to human beings and to all animal life as well. During the Spanish-American War it was found that more disease and deaths, in the army, were attributable to insects than to bullets. The common house-fly came under severe criticism as a filthy and undesirable guest in the homes. Although plant life and animal life has myriads of enemies in the insect world, which will require all the skill of the farmer and physician to combat; yet we must not conclude, said the speaker, that all insects are enemies of man, for many are friends and fellow helpers, most prominent perhaps the Silk-Worm and Honey Bee. The annual value of silk produced by the Silk-Worm amounts to 200 million dollars and the annual value of honey produced in the United States 20 million dollars. Also insects, especially the bee, does a great work in the pollinating of clover, flower, and fruit blossoms. He showed the position that insects occupy in life in the world; then followed a detailed description of the external and internal anatomy of the grass-hopper drawing attention to the difference between its mouth-parts and those of sucking insects. He then gave the life history of a few insects to show the different changes they under went and the enormous rate at which some of the species increase, and gave spraying prescriptions for eradicating the many pests of the orchard. A glowing tribute was paid to our birds as the great benefactors of man, by destroying millions of injurious insects and weed-seeds every year. This has been proved by official experts, in the employ of the United States Government, who have gone to the haunts of many different kinds of birds and by killing a directing have found hundreds of the injurious insects and weed-seeds in their stomachs swallowed from field and orchard. At the close brief addresses were made by James Simpson, Patrick Reid, John McGuigan and John O'Brien, all expressive of the importance of this subject to the farmer. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Coughlan to which he made suitable reply. Mr. Coughlan leaves, to take up his studies at Truro College on Nov. 3rd. Hope River is to be congratulated in having not only one but two young men taking the full college course at Truro. Mr. Everett Hogan, who has been secretary at the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, during the past summer, is the other.

PRICE OF LABOR.—A farmer in the Belfast district writing to "The Guardian, on the 27th inst., says, among other things, "several fields of grain were harvested here last week, but most of this grain was scarcely fit to be housed. It was not left out long enough to get dry. There are a lot of potatoes in this locality to be dug yet. The farmers many of them, find it very difficult to get help to harvest their potato crop and still those who have been fortunate enough to get youngsters to pick their potatoes only pay them on an average, 50 cents a day.

DRAMATIC RECITAL.—Last week a very pleasing Dramatic Recital was given by Miss Bertha Gorman in the Hall of Kelly's Cross. Miss Gorman who has recently graduated from the Emersonian School of Oratory in Boston, intends to make a tour through the Island, giving recitals in the different centres; and she began the series in Kelly's Cross which happens to be her birthplace. It is to be regretted that the unfavorable weather prevented many from attending and enjoying the evening's entertainment which was, undoubtedly, of a very high order. Miss Gorman's recitations, which were well chosen and well delivered, gave unmistakable evidence of good taste and good training; and these cannot fail to bring her success in her chosen profession.

BREAK IN ENGLISH APPLE MARKET.—The following will be of interest to apple exporters in P. E. Island. Cables from England announce a decline in the apple market shipments of the Nova Scotia product suffering in consequence. The crop in price is about equivalent to a dollar per barrel and is charged to the market being glutted by recent heavy shipments, and the protracted warm weather. The fruit ripened too quickly to sell in its best condition if held for a recovery of values, disposals having to be made almost immediately on arrival. Number one Ribstons brought from Halifax by the Almeriana, sold at between twelve and fourteen shillings per barrel; first grade Blenheim from thirteen shillings outright, and Kings averaged between fifteen and sixteen shillings. In sympathy with the low London and Liverpool prices, the German apple market has eased off at corresponding values.

BLIZZARD RAGING
 IN DULUTH, MINN.

DULUTH, Minn., Oct. 28.—The first real winter weather of the season struck the Western portion of the Northwest and Canada today, and

reached Duluth tonight. A northeast blizzard, heavy snow, and low temperature prevails here, and the cold will continue all day tomorrow, according to the forecast.

Snow is falling over a wide area. Ships delayed in reaching Duluth are thought to be in shelter. Lake Superior is extremely tempestuous and outgoing vessels are held in the harbor.
