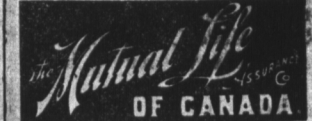

# NEWS OF THE HORSES FROM ALL SOURCES

Redd Doble was seriously injured by a vicious stallion at his stable in San Jose, Calif., last week. The horse very unexpectedly seized him by the arm and shook Mr. Doble, terribly, throwing him to the floor and tramping on him. Grooms rushed to his assistance and rescued him. He is now in the hospital and recovering. Mr. Doble is nearly 70 years of age. He came before the public over 40 years ago, when the brown gelding Duxer, which he marked in 2:17 1/2, when he was sold to Robert Bonner, the price being \$33,000. He next had Goldsmith Maid, which was the greatest campaigner of her time. A year ago he wintered Lou Dillon, 1:38 1/2.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—J. C. Van Ness, Electioneer, winner of this year's Futurity, today won the \$11,000 colts' half of the Produce stakes, six furlongs, at Brighton Beach. He was practically neglected in the betting, opening at 6 to 1, his price gradually going up to 12 to 1 at the close. De Muid, P. J. Raney's \$30,000 colt, an even money favorite, was second, with H. P. Whitney's Paumotu, another 12 to 1 shot, third. The time was 1:12 3/8, which equals the best time for the stakes. The fillet's half of the Produce stakes, six furlongs and worth \$10,000 to the winner, resulted in an easy victory for the 1 to 3 favorite Court Dress, belonging to James R. Keene, with Barbara Bell second and Common Sea third.

Oro, 2:05 1/4, is the fastest trotter descending from Onward, 2:25 1/4. Geers and McHenry are the leading money winning drivers this year. The 2:10 list for 1906 up to last Saturday numbered 80 performers of which 22 are trotters.

Blue Hill by Bingen is doing splendidly in his work and is liable to be prominent at Lexington.

Gertrude Pointer, 2:20 1/4, is a new one to the credit of Sidney Pointer, s. r. o. Angus Pointer, 2:02 3/4.

C. H. Triller's Arion mare, Milton, 2:21 1/4, has a filly at her side by Sidney Dillon, the sire of Lou Dillon.

Nancy Hanks, 2:04 is again a champion. She is the only mare with a record under 2:10 to produce two 2:10 trotters.

Prominent entries for the Kentucky Futurity for three-year-old trotters at Lexington this week: Gay Bingen, 2:12 1/2; Cochato, 2:11 1/2; Ed Custer, 2:12 1/2; Governor Francis, 2:12 1/2; Daffodil D., 2:12 1/2; The Abbe, 2:10 1/2.

If all are right from the word "go" the Kentucky Futurity for three-year-old trotters at Lexington this week will be a memorable race. Never was the field a richer one, never was there so much scratching of heads in village grocery stores or speculation among followers of the light harness game over the outcome. Any one of the six young trotters may land the big purse and each will be well backed to win by the talent. The bookmakers will have a hard time figuring out the odds and the talent at sea as to which youngster to pick.

At the beginning of the season there were only a few candidates in sight that were believed to have a chance in the big three-year-old race of the year. Gay Bingen of the great Bingen family at the start of the grand circuit was the most promising. He won a couple of sparkling races then and took a record of 2:12 1/2 with such ease that he looked like a 2:10 trotter, which in the case of a three-year-old means pretty nearly a champion. Then he went lame and how he will show up in the race is a matter of conjecture.

Ed Custer, another likely winner, has succeeded in beating both Gay Bingen and Cochato, a race after Cochato had won the opening heat at Readville meeting in 2:11 1/2, and Gay Bingen had pulled up lame. Then the colts took different routes from Readville, Ed Custer going West and the other two following the circuit.

At Hartford Cochato won the Futurity, getting \$17,000 for his day's work, but the race was slow.

Then two weeks ago, two new candidates for the Kentucky that had not been given a thought, although known to have a lot of speed, loomed up.

These were Governor Francis and Daffodil D. Governor Francis came to the front at Milwaukee when he won in straight heats with Ed Custer second each time in 2:13 1/2 and 2:12 1/2. This son of Arion on account of the performance has made a deep impression on horsemen, and big things are expected of him.

Daffodil D. is by the pacer Directly, 2:04, son of the pacer Direct, 2:30, and her win in Syracuse was certainly classy enough to make the filly a large factor in the futurity.

Her miles were 2:13 1/2 and back of her were The Abbe, which took the opening heat in 2:14; Cordero, Direct Wilkes and Cochato, the latter being distanced in the first heat.

The Abbe, which won a heat at Syracuse in 2:10, must also be considered as a likely winner of the Kentucky stake, although he cannot be rated with Cochato, Dr. Francis, Ed Custer, Daffodil D. and Gay Bingen, that are named in the futurity. Yet there is still a chance that owing to the fortunes of racing he may become prominent.

From the nature of their digestive tract horses are calculated to subsist largely upon a concentrated ration, and, under good methods of feeding, hay is calculated more to add the necessary bulk to the ration than to provide the animal with the nutriment required by hard work. As fed upon the average farm, hay is depended upon too largely perhaps to provide this nutriment, and too much hay, especially where either very palatable or of poor quality, is fed and in connection with poor judgment in working, often causes heaves or other pulmonary or digestive troubles. Hay, when first made, contains a good deal of moisture, which afterwards, dries out in the sweating process, so-called. Even though it appears to be quite dry when put into the mow, hay that is not over-ripe or over-dry, will soon become tough, and in some cases heats considerably while curing out in the mow. While in this condition it is not fit food for a horse, but as ordinarily fed from the top edge of the mow, where there is no heat or fermentation, there should be nothing about new hay that would be deleterious to the horse. The only trouble is that it is more palatable than old hay, and where he has opportunity to do so a horse is apt to eat more than is desirable. Of course, for road horses, old hay would be better until the new crop is thoroughly cured out, but horses at rapid or very heavy work require less hay and more concentrates than horses which are performing ordinary farm work.
