THE FULL TEXT OF AN IMPORTANT JUDGMENT

Among the judgments delivered in the Supreme Court at Charlottetown last week was that given in the case of John F. Hodgeson vs. John Hall. This case was tried in Summerside at the November Term of the Supreme Court before Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and a jury. The jury found a verdict for the plaintiff against the defendant, who was for \$2,500.00. Application was made by the defendant's counsel to have the verdict set aside and for a new trial. Mr. Justice Haszard delivered the judgment of the court as follows:

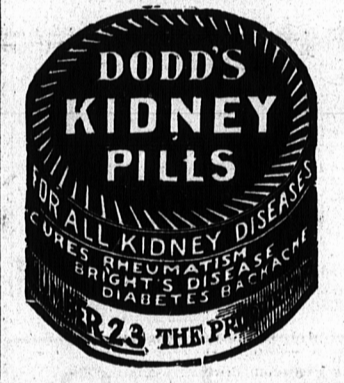
"This is an application for a new trial on the following grounds: 1. That the verdict was contrary to evidence and by the direction of the Judge and perverse. 2. That the damages found for the plaintiff were excessive. 3. That the declaration contained two counts. 4. That defendant wrongfully enticed and procured the plaintiff's wife without the consent and against the will of the plaintiff, to depart and remain absent from the house and society of the plaintiff. 5. That the plaintiff's wife unlawfully and without the consent of the plaintiff departed from the house and society of the plaintiff, and the defendant well knowing the premises wrongfully and without the consent, and against the will of the plaintiff, received, harboured and detained the plaintiff's wife and refused to deliver her to the plaintiff so to do, whereby the defendant lost the society and service of his said wife. 6. That the defendant pleaded not guilty and denied the allegations on said count 4. On the trial before His Lordship Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, at Summerside in November term last, the jury found a verdict for the plaintiff for \$2,500. This application is made to set aside the verdict on the grounds before stated:

"There is no evidence in the evidence in this case and the law bearing thereon I am of the opinion that there should be a new trial on the ground that the verdict found was against the weight of evidence and contrary to the judge's charge. 2. There is no evidence that satisfied one or that in my opinion should satisfy a reasonable jury, that the defendant did anything more than a parent had a right to do, and which it was his duty to do in protecting his own child. 3. Plaintiff's wife's evidence is that in consequence of differences and unpleasantness with the plaintiff's mother who lived in the same house, and the refusal of her husband to procure a servant for her when unable through delicate health to do the work of her house; and because of the peculiar conduct of the plaintiff she became and was afraid of him and left him, and eventually refused to return. Now I can find no evidence that the defendant at any time wrongfully enticed the plaintiff's wife to depart and remain absent from the plaintiff's home. Nor is there evidence of his harbouring her or doing any more than a parent should do when his daughter either rightly or wrongly sought the shelter of her father's house. 4. On the contrary the weight of evidence clearly shows that the defendant endeavored to induce his daughter to return to the plaintiff's house and to live with him. 5. The judge in charging the jury

GENERAL SIR L. RUNDLE RESIGNS HIS COMMAND

LONDON, May 16.—The official announcement is made that Gen. Sir Leslie Rundle, who for some time commanded the 5th Army, has resigned. The new appointment is made of Lieut.-Gen. Sir J. Wolfe Murray as general officer and commander-in-chief of the first class. The Times suggests his probable appointment to home command. His Christian name Wolfe, commemorates the friendship of Gen. Wolfe for Col. Murray, of the Black Watch, in whose arms he died on the heights of Abraham. Much interest has been taken in the King's grant of the Victoria Cross to the Indian hero, Lance Naik Lala, of the 41st Dogras, for his most conspicuous bravery in risking death several times to rescue wounded British officers.

brought to their attention "the relative duties and position of father, child and husband." In closing he said:—"The plaintiff coming into this Court has to prove to your satisfaction that he has made out his case; and the law casts the onus upon him to prove to you that this father wrongfully and with improper motive caused his daughter to separate from her husband." This in my opinion is a correct statement of the law and in view of such a charge I am of opinion that a jury reviewing the whole of the evidence reasonably could not properly find the verdict they did. "The verdict should be set aside and a new trial granted."
