felt and placed in front of the round.

In another generation homes will include the acoustical material in all specifications. Two-story houses will have acoustical material put between the ceiling and floor and the commercial type will be used on the ceiling.

Draperies lined and drawn across the windows or walls can decrease sound. This is often necessary in homes where members of the family sleep during the day since they work at night.

**ANCIENT BEAUTIES**

How beautiful was the lady of 5,000 years ago? Did she use make-up, wear jewellery, and furnish her home with finery to attract the eye of the visiting male? Most of these questions are answered by a recent gift of Egyptian antiquities, donated to the Royal Ontario Museum by the late Sir Robert Mond, a former director of the International Nickel Company of Canada, Limited. Sir Robert subscribed to Egyptian expeditions of the Museum. He also built his own collection, composed of an amazing variety of priceless Egyptian treasures. The collection contains, among other items, a cosmetic palette, which was used to mix make-up pigments in approximately 3,000 B.C. Female figurines, pottery and stone vessels testify to the high level of art in ancient Egypt, and funerary objects contribute to our present knowledge of burial customs of long ago.

**Theme Talk:**

We hear so much today about building a new world and to us its future citizens, this is of vital interest. If this new world of tomorrow is to be one of law and order, decency, freedom and justice, it must have solid foundations in the character of its citizens. This means that we have many wrongs to right, many outrages to stop, many trades to cleanse. We will consider one of the most sordid of these trades — the liquor trade.

Do you know that last year the legitimate liquor sales in Canada amounted to nearly \$38 for every man, woman and child in the country? How many gave that much to the church of God, to worthy organizations aimed at building a clean, worthwhile community? This waste of millions of dollars in our country each year would be a grave concern, but waste is far from the worst consequence. Let us consider some facts regarding the use of liquor on morals and character. A famous judge has this to say: "94 per cent of the prisoners sentenced in this court were drinking men and women. Out of 120 divorce cases in this court 71 were caused by drink. Furthermore every civil action regarding an automobile accident with one exception had liquor involved. It is juvenile delinquency, the cause of 40 per cent of neglected children, it is responsible for the spread of disease and for much domestic unhappiness which cannot be put into figures."

It is character rather than economic strength that finally decides a nation's destiny. The most effective and most direct action in the matter is to resolve to have no part in a business fraught with so much evil either by indulging in its wares or by sharing in any way in its profits. You will then have a strong basis of self respect from which to exert your influence as a Christian citizen.

**"I DON'T REMEMBER!"**

In our Nanaimo session of Assize Court recently a learned treatise on alcoholism, its degrades, peculiarities and general effects was supplied by an eminent witness. That certain "period of forgetfulness" which has occurred for so many men who did know enough to quit when the reasonable limit was reached, came in for its full share of explanation from the medical expert point of view. It will not be very comforting for such imbibers to learn that from a scientific standpoint the reason for many of these cases, destroy the human motive element and they become "gutter drunk" which means that they collapse and become immobile.

With others who take too much they manage to remain mobile and they actually walk and talk so rationally and relevantly that they fool people they encounter... and yet their mental controls may be completely gone, the memory absent from the brain, autonomous powers remaining, but otherwise mere automatons, irresponsible, incapable of mentally differentiating between right and wrong, perhaps committing heinous crimes, mentally incapable of "intent" so to do.

Even the casual or temperate men in the courtroom followed this physician's words with interest for he gave the results of experiences he has accumulated since 1907 throughout a continuous specialized practice since that time. This man has been superintendent of a sanitarium where mental and alcoholism cases are treated. He is a psychiatrist who through the years has been specially delegated to examine all persons accused of murder or felonious crimes in this province, to make his expert reports to the attorney-general of British Columbia.

Words and decisions from a man of such prolonged and wide specialized experience should carry much weight, and it would have been a splendid lesson for a great many men who fall back on that time worn, but apparently true, excuse when deeds of regret are recounted: "I don't remember!" If the words of the expert are true, they never will! —The Nanaimo Free Press.
