

Am. League Blanks Service Stars 5-0

Bob Feller Driven From Mound In Second Inning As 65,000 Fans Look On

MUNICIPAL STADIUM, Cleveland, July 7.—(AP)—The American League All-Stars shut out the service stars 5-0 in Cleveland's flood-lit Municipal Stadium tonight before an estimated crowd of 65,000.

The American Leaguers drove pitcher Bobby Feller, Cleveland's fireballer, from the mound in the first two innings, scoring three runs on four hits before he was replaced by Johnny Rigney, late of Chicago White Sox. Rigney allowed only three hits in five innings and gave way to Mincey Harris, formerly of Boston Red Sox at the start of the seventh.

The Americans quickly scored two runs off Harris. Phil Rizzuto



Reiser leads Williams leads Bears whip Medwick for Royals 5-1

CHICAGO, July 7.—(AP)—By less than one percentage point Ted Williams, the 1941 American League batting champion, today took over the lead in this year's swat race.

The Boston Red Sox outfielder hit an even 500 pace last week to rise 21 points. This coincided with an 18 point drop by Joe Gordon of the Yankees and enabled Williams to move in front with a mark of 3473 to Gordon's 3467.

Thus, last year's 406 slugger led the leagues top 10 for the first time this year.

Besides Williams phenomenal gain, young Vernon Stephens of St. Louis Browns climbed from the sub-300 ranks 314, good enough for seventh place. But the rest of the top hitters either recorded slight gains or lost ground. Cleveland Indians Les Fleming was among the latter, dropping 16 points to 332. Last week Fleming was in second place. Now he's fifth.

Trailing them on the list of leading regulars were Ray Lammanno, Cincinnati, 307; Johnny Mize, New York, 301; Dixie Walker, Brooklyn, 297; Mickey Owen, Brooklyn, 291; Max Marshall, Cincinnati, 291 and Bill Nicholson, Chicago, 287.

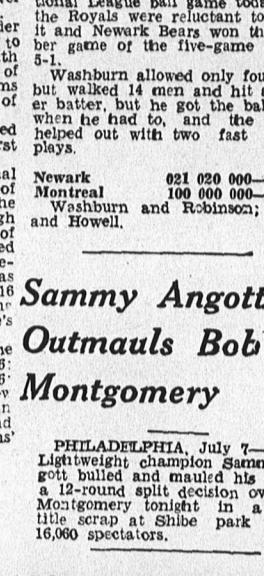
Williams leads Bears whip Royals 5-1

The 10 soccer clubs making up the London League hit the jackpot financially this season in comparison with previous years so they decided at a meeting to continue as an "outlaw" organization despite an invitation from the Football League to rejoin its ranks.

The clubs informed the League they are availing themselves of a "freedom of action" ruling passed by the Football Association during the First Great War. They wish to remain members of the Football League, however, and are willing to give a measure of financial support. Each London League club will receive approximately \$1,400 from this season's profits.

The Football League has proposed that the London League clubs, without Portsmouth and Brighton, be included in a new team from Luton Towns form one of five sections suggested for a league tournament next season, to be followed by a joint league and cup competition.

"Y" defeats Army 14-6

Service boxers To help U.S.O.

NEW YORK, July 7.—(AP)—Starting off a series of fights in which Navy Marine and Coast Guard boxers will do their stuff for the United Service Organizations, welterweight champion Fred (Red) Cochrane will tangle with undefeated Ray Robinson in a 10-round non-title tussle Sept. 10 in Madison Square Garden.

Announcing the fight today, Promoter Mike Jacobs explained that the series will go through the fall and winter season, will be held in New York, Chicago and various other cities and that service boxers will appear "with the cooperation of the Navy Department" for the benefit of U.S.O.

Cochrane enlisted in the Navy last August, shortly after taking the welterweight crown away from prizefighter Ziv. Now a Boatwain's Mate, he is stationed at San Diego, Calif. In his two most recent ring appearances he whipped ex-lightweight boss Lew Jenkins and dropped a decision to southpaw Garvey Young of the Marines.

Robinson, unbeaten in 2 1-2 years of professional fighting, has been regarded for some time as the "unconquered champion" of the 147-pounders. He is slated to take on lightweight boss Sammy Angott in the Garden July 31.
