CANADIAN SEED CORN IS AGAIN AVAILABLE
Coming to the effectiveness with control measures have been taken out in southwestern Ont- ario the European Corn Borer has been curbed to such an extent that production has again reached con- siderable volume. Canadian-grown seed is always preferred because it is adapted to Canadian conditions. To obtain this popular source of supply seed available for the coming season the Department of Agriculture in Ottawa through its Plant Inspec- tion Service is giving special atten- tion to the inspection and certifica- tion of shelled corn for seed. While seed corn can be shipped out of the quarantine area only when ac- companied by a proper certificate, this precaution ensures absolute freedom from the possibility of spreading corn borer infestation. That larvae of the borer require a certain amount of moisture in which to be carried and that much too large to lodge in a shell of corn. Therefore, the Do- minion Entomologist assures, where a particle of cob or stalk remains on the shelled corn it may be safely stripped and used.

The many relatives and friends of Mr. Cornelius A. MacIntyre were grieved to learn that he had passed away in St. Mary's Hospi- tal, Seattle, Wash., on February 1st, 1932, in his sixty-seventh year, after an operation on January 30. He had been taking treatment for some little time, but his condition was not considered serious until a short time before death. He passed peacefully away, consoled by the last rites of his church, in the presence of his parish priest and the devoted Sisters of the hospi- tal. His funeral was held on February 3rd. to Holy Rosary Church where a High Mass of Requiem was celebrated. Burial was in Calvary Cemetery, the pa- rishoners attending in large num- bers, among whom were several former P. E. Islanders. The mem- bers of Holy Name Society at- tended in a body, also the Carpen- ters Union of Seattle. Mr. MacIn- tyre was born in New Annan, P. E. Island, son of the late Hugh and Martina (MacDonald) MacIntyre. He leaves to mourn, one brother, Mr. P. S. MacIntyre, of Kensing- ton, the others of that large fam- ily having predeceased him, his eldest brother Joseph J. having passed away only three weeks be- fore. His sister the late Mrs. David MacDonald of Glenfinnan, died eleven years ago. Mr. MacIntyre went to U. S. A. when quite a young man; going first to Boston, where his brother Angus D., was employed with the Eastern Steam- ship Co. Leaving Boston after a few years, he went to Duluth, Minn. where he remained until the gold rush in '98 when, with a num- ber of other young men he start- ed for the Klondyke where he spent some few years mining with varying success. Finding his health falling somewhat he moved south to Seattle where he built a com- fortable home and continued his trade as mechanic until the autu- mn of '31. Not feeling as well as usual, he went into hospital, with the above sad result. He visited his native Province several times since going abroad, the last visit being ten years ago when he spent six months on the Island, guest of Mr. and Mrs. P. S. MacIntyre, Ken- sington.-R. I.
